

Girls crew in spotlight at state championship

Life on top is full of laughs.

Just ask the Outrigger Canoe Club's girls 16 crew. They are the defending state champions in that event for the club that is the overall defending state champion.

"We're here because we want to be here," said Mahealani Lum. a returnee from last year's championship crew. "We all love to paddle so we're happy to be

That's evident not only at practice, but at every regatta Outrigger enters. Giggles and smiles are almost a mandatory part of their warm-up.

And it has produced winning results. Entering Saturday's Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association State Championship Regatta on Kauai, the Outrigger girls 16 crew has won five of seven races this year.

"We don't feel like there's pressure on us to win," said paddler Meleana Blaich. "So we go into all our races relaxed."

That's not to say that the crew does not work hard. "When it's time to be serious, we're serious," said Nanea Tannehill, another returnee from last year's

Like once a race starts. Each of the girls in the crew has a physically slim build, but as Lum put it: "We paddle with our hearts."

"I'd say they're pretty much the favorites to win," said Kalani Schrader, Outrigger's head coach as well as the girls 16 crew

Hui Nalu inducts Mokuahi

Club enters coach in its Hall of Honor

HAWAII KAI — Hui Nalu coach Sam Mokuahi Ir. was inducted into the club's Hall of Honor last week for his contribution to the sport of canoe paddling.

Mokuahi was inducted into the Na Mea Hanohono o Hui Nalu along with Edward K. "Dudie" Miller as part of the club's 58th anniversary celebration. The honorees were nominated by the club's membership, both past and present.

"That was something they didn't have to do," Mokuahi said. "But boy, I'm sure in there with some good company."

With the induction of Mokuahi and Miller, the Hall of Honor's membership roster grows to eight. The two paddlers join the likes of Duke Kahanamoku, Hilda Ma Mutch, Myron "Pinky" Thompson, Kala Kukea and Nainoa Thompson.

Mokuahi and Miller's names will be added to the Hall of Honor's perpetual award, which was designed and crafted by Walter Bowman Sr.

The award — which shows a canoe surfing a wave — is made from the same hau as the voyaging canoe Hokulea. The honorees were also presented koa paddles that Bowman carved.

"I'm holding on to the trophy right now," Mokuahi said. "I guess they want me to hold on to it because I'm the coach and we don't have a trophy room or a clubhouse yet. When we get one, I bet our trophy room will be as crowded as Outrigger's."
