Holdredge proving a seaworthy captain

Women, it seems, have had a difficult time breaking into the male-dominated world of charter-boat fishing.

Captain Myrna Holdredge, however, is one of the exceptions. She broke into the field nearly 10 years ago, serving as an apprentice deckhand aboard a charter fishing boat.

"It took about a year and a half to convince somebody to hire me," said Holdredge, who was then a waitress and bartender. "I had to do a whole lot of talking - persist. That was it, basically, I really persisted. I'd show up at the dock and they'd say,

'Oh no, not you again.''

Eventually, captain **Bud**Abbott hired her as a deckhand on his boat, Pisces.

"He was the first one to hire me," Holdredge said. "And I landed a good gaff (exactly where Abbott told her to gaff the fish) the first time out.

"Bud also appreciated the fact that I kind of took care of the passengers on the boat and came to work clean, not drunk. We always laughed about that."

Holdredge worked one year as a deckhand. She then went to The Pacific Maritime Academy in Honolulu to study for the U.S. Coast Guard test that would enable her to obtain her captain's li-

"I started running the Pisces as soon as I got my license," Holdredge said. She ran the boat for about eight months and fished in the 1977 Hawaiian International Billfish Tournament as one of the skippers in the charter boat

"I was the first lady to run a boat in the Billfish Tournament," she said. "We got really lucky because the first day we caught the first fish of the tournament and ended up boating three fish that day. It kind of put me on the

Still, Holdredge admits, "It's pretty much a macho business and there'll always be a little bit of flack (towards women). But for the most part, just because I've been here (so long), I've had a lot of guys compliment me for sticking it out."
