Marlin are warming up to the idea of arriving in Hawaii waters early

random notes from the marlin

capital of Hawaii: They're biting. Although it's early in the season, people are hooking into a lot of big marlin these days, according to

Chuck Daxboeck, a scientist with the Pacific Gamefish Foundation. The organization is based in Kona

Kailua-"I have no idea why they Daxboeck

are biting this early," Daxboeck said. "Perhaps the water is warming or returning to normal faster than expected after that last real severe El Nino (coldwater current). The waters are probably a degree or a degree and a half warmer than normal for this time of year, and I suspect the females are following the warmer water."

The marlin mystique remains because scientists still don't know exactly where the fish travels from.

Marathon Marlin. A black marlin weighing 130 pounds was caught and tagged on Jan. 6, 1983, off Cabo San

KAILUA-KONA - Some Lucas, Mexico. Twenty-one months later, on Sept. 11, 1984, it was recovered northwest of New Zealand. The marlin traveled 5,763 miles, moving from the Northern Hemisphere to the Southern Hemisphere. It set the world record for longest distance

traveled in a straight line. Man against marlin. One of the longest man vs. fish battles ever recorded took place last September off Kona.

Jamie Berzanskis, Jerry Shaughnessy and Lincoln Ahlo Jr. tied into a marlin that weighed between 1,000. and 2,000 pounds. Captain Ralph Rehberg of Kona said the action started at 10 a.m. on a Wednesday and lasted until the huge fish broke the line and swam free at 8:30 a.m. the next day.

The anglers took turns in the fighting chair and, even though it was three against one, the marlin won.

Marlin moves. The Pacific Gamefish Foundation, a nonprofit organization that studies marlin habits, has moved to more spacious headquarters in the Gentry's Kona Marina at Honokohau Harbor. It, will be open to the public perhaps as early as next

Outriggers paddle into picture as candidate for official state sport

Hawaii has a state song, a state tree and, most recently, a state fish. So it only makes sense that the Legislature is looking into designating a state sport: outrigger canoe

At least that's the idea of Rep. Cam Cavasso, Republican from Lanikai-Keolu-Waimanalo, whose father first put him in a canoe at the age of two and who has raced since 13.

Paddling "reaches out to all people of Hawaii from 12 years and younger to the kupuna (elders)," he said. "It encourages the family to come together."

Cavasso introduced a resolution, which has paddled out of House Ocean and Marine Resources Committee, endorsing the idea of outrigger canoe paddling as an official state sport and suggesting a bill to

that effect be introduced next year. The resolution was adopted by the House.

Cavasso said he wants the sport to be taken more seriously by the state. Some racers aren't even welcome on beaches here, he said.

The head coach and director of the Outrigger Canoe Club, Henry Ayau, recently told the House committee that in ancient Hawaii, outrigger canoes were used to move families, armies, food and animals between the islands.

The president of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association, Michael Tongg, said paddling has become increasingly popular. Over 60 canoe clubs are currently in Hawaii compared to just four 35 years ago, he
