## Sailing canoes will compete

**HONOLULU** — The Hoomanao Challenge '89, a six-man outrigger sailing canoe race from Maui to Oahu slated for Sunday, May 28, will donate 100 percent of its entry fees to Winners Camp, a non-profit youth education program.

Winners Camp, founded three years ago by Delores Gregoire, president of Hawaii Study Tours, Inc. is based on the principal of "Optimal Learning." It is an intensive learning program for youths 12 through 18-years old designed to build esteem, develop social skills and skills for accelerated learning.

Each program consists of about 80 participants and is held at the Sheraton Makaha Resort. Winners Camp incorporates the philosophy that all people are born winners, that learning can be fun and that fun can be educational.

The announcement was made by Mike Muller, race director, who is an outrigger canoe sailor interested in perpetuating the Winners Camp philosophy and preserving the ancient Hawaiian culture has organized Hoomanao as a way of doing both.

The 75-mile event is the first race of its kind between Maui and Oahu. It begins at 5:30 a.m. at Kaanapali, Maui and crosses the often treacherous Kaiwi (Molokai) channel to finish, an estimated nine hours later, in Waikiki.

On May 27, competitors will be on Kaanapali beach all day rigging their canoes in the traditional style. The race is open to qualified athletes interested in racing outrigger sailing canoes. Muller expects about 15 entries this year, with a projected growth to 40 canoes by 1992.

Contenders include Kauai's Hanalei Canoe Club, Oahu's Outrigger Canoe Club and Hui Nalu Canoe Club, the Maui Sailing team and Island Tan team. A team from Winners Camp is also entered. The event has a total purse of \$13,400.

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## Long Memorial weekend long on recreational activities

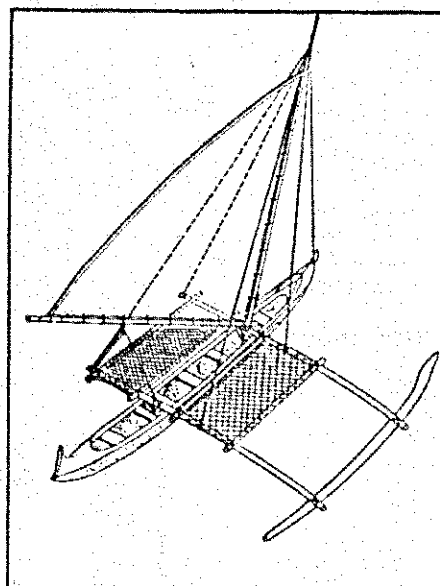
Some of the other events highlighting the long weekend:

■ **Hawaii State Special Olympics:** More than 700 athletes will compete in the 21st annual event, scheduled for the University of Hawaii lower campus. The Games officially begin at 7 p.m., Friday, with opening ceremonies at Rainbow Stadium. The Olympic torch will be carried in by law enforcement officers on the last leg of the around-the-island Troy Barboza Torch Run.

Competition in soccer, aquatics, track and field is scheduled for Cooke Field from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturday, and 8 a.m. to noon, Sunday. Closing ceremonies follow Sunday's events.

■ **Ho'ole'ole Jackpot Fishing Tournament:** Some 80 teams are expected to be entered by Friday's 5 p.m. deadline, according to Al Bento, Commodore of co-host Hawaii Yacht Club. Entry fee is \$500 per team for what is considered Oahu's largest jackpot event.

Registration is at the Waikiki Yacht Club from noon until 5 p.m., Friday. Fishing is from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m.,

Tan team. Also competing are crews from Hanalei, Molokai, Outrigger and Hui Nalu canoe clubs and a team from the Maui Canoe Sailing Association.

The first canoe is expected across the finish line near the Royal Hawaiian Hotel around 2:30 p.m. Sunday. The event is a benefit for the non-profit youth education program, Winner's Camp. Cash prizes are awarded to the first five finishers, with the winning crew earning \$5,000.

■ **Keauhou-Kona Triathlon:** Oahu's Ruben Chappins returns to defend his title against a strong field of international competitors in Sunday's Big Island event. The 1.2-mile swim, 56-mile bike ride and 13.1-mile run begins at 6:30 a.m. with the swim at Keauhou Bay.

Chappins set the course record of 4 hours, 23 minutes, 40 seconds, last year. Hawaii's Sally Law is the defending women's champ, after also setting a course record last year of 4:54:07. The awards ceremony is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. at the Keauhou Beach Hotel.

■ **Surf into Summer:** The survivors of last weekend's opening competition continue catching waves off Kuloa Beach Saturday through Sunday. The amateur event is the largest in the state with over 600 entrants.

The event has 16 divisions with the top four finishers in the men's open class earning entries into the Gotcha Pro event next month. Heats get underway at 9 a.m. each day.

■ **Tedeschi 10-Kilometer Race:** More than 400 runners are expected for the Valley Isle's most popular event that

begins at 7 a.m. Sunday at Keokea Park in Kula. The course offers a scenic tour of upcountry Maui, including a 1,000-foot drop in elevation before ending at the sponsoring Tedeschi Vineyard in Ulupalakua.

Also on the jammed sports agenda for spectators and participants are: ■ The Hawaii Sectional Tennis Championships, starting its 10-day run at the Diamond Head Tennis Center Courts Saturday.

■ The Around Oahu Yacht Race starting Saturday and finishing Monday off Waikiki.

■ Celebrity benefit polo matches at Mokuleia beginning at 2 p.m. Sunday.
