Outrigger Wins July 4 Macfarlane Regatta

Outrigger Canoe Club's undefeated masters men won the last event of the day to ensure victory in the 53rd annual Walter J.

Macfarlane Regatta on the 4th of July at Waikiki Beach.

After Outrigger catapulted to an early lead by capturing the first four events of the day, the lead changed hands many times throughout the day with Lanikai matching OCC gold for gold, and silver for silver. In 17 of the 32 races, the two clubs finished 1-2. Outrigger won a total of 14 events, while Lanikai won 15, leaving two victories for Hui Nalu and one for Kailua.

Outrigger eventually pulled ahead for good when the mixed men and women and the masters men won two of the final three races of the day. Outrigger scored 111 points to Lanikai's 101. Kailua finished a distant third with 47 points, followed by Hui Nalu with 35 and Waikiki Surf Club with 16 in the AA Division. Anuenue won the A Division with 13 points.

Guaranteed 20 Minute Lunch Service In Dining Room or No Charge

Many of you in the business community want to have a nice lunch but can't take an hour and a half to do it. Your time is limited and valuable.

OCC has the answer. The Club has initiated a new program to guarantee that you and your guests can enjoy lunch in the Dining Room and still be able to be back in your offices in good time.

Here's how the program works. The concept is simply that the food will be on the table 20 minutes after you place the order. When you arrive, notify the host/hostess and your waitperson that you would like the "20 Minute Menu".

The waitperson then writes the time that the order was taken on the check, repeats that time to you, the member, and announces the time

that you will be served the item(s). An example would be "it's now 12:15 p.m., therefore you will have your meal by 12:35 p.m."

A red table tent will be put on your table to identify it as a "20 Minute Table".

Here's the important part. If you are not served your meal within the 20 minute time frame, those items will not be charged to your bill!

This program began in July—which means it will already have been in effect by the time you read this article. It will only be applicable in the Main Dining Room—not on the Hau Terrace. If you have only a limited amount of time for lunch, come try out this new innovation that the Club has designed especially for you, the business person. O

Already their plans include a day of events, starting with digging our own beachside imu and cooking the pig on-site.

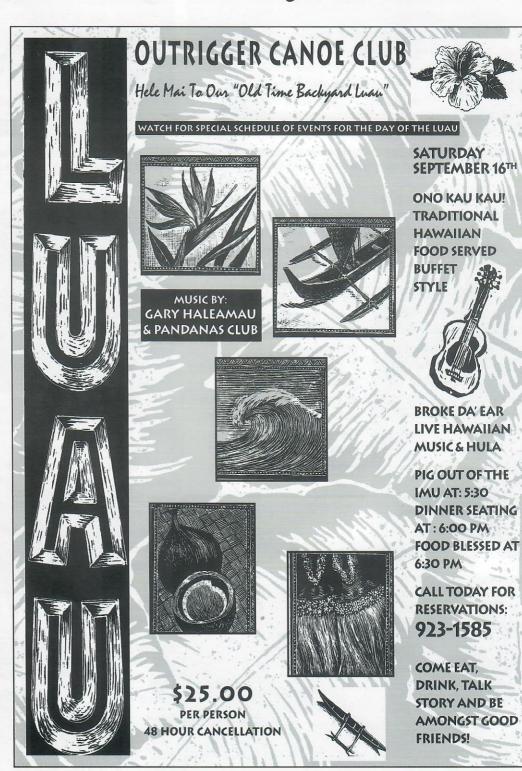
Bring your ukuleles, your beach mats and surfboards and spend Saturday, September 16 with us preparing for the Luau.

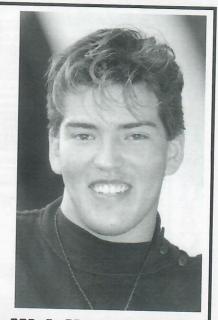

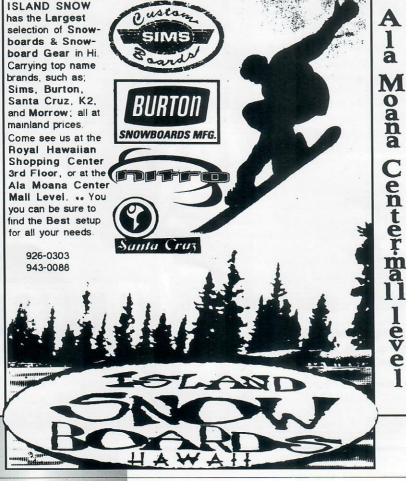

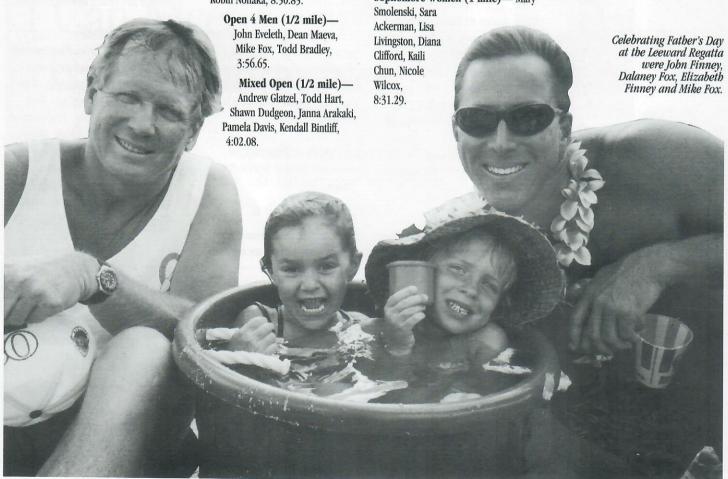

rom the Trainer

ugust ends another successful Regatta season. Congratulations to everyone and for those of you continuing on. long distance season has arrived. I would like to express the importance of cross training with low impact cardiovascular programs to increase your ability to paddle long distances without fatigue.

Do your program twice a week for 30 to 60 minutes at your personal maximum heart rate. Workouts such as biking, stairmaster, running up hill on a treadmill and sand training are

really good tools.

Sand training, a high-resistance, low impact cardiovascular workout, is the focus of this issue.



All moves are done in the flat soft sand.

Do all drills in the Neutral Spine Form.

Remember to pull in your abdominal, on the exhale of

breathing.

Shoes are an option.

Bring a towel for the warm-up and cool-down.

Start With a Warm-up

Begin Neutral Strong Walking for 5 to 8 minutes, then return to Neutral Strong Stance. Do pelvic tilts forward and back, side to side, and circle equal number of times. Roll your shoulders forward and back, up and down.

Now lie down on your back on a towel. Raise your knees up and keep your feet flat. Now do a complete round of

abdominal. Start with the lower

to side. Do 10 to 25 repetitions in each position. By exercising the muscles of the abdomen, this will help

to stabilize and support your back during the training drills. Slowly, stand up and take three deep power breaths.

Position: Line up facing your strip of training sand.

Skipping

Start slow, focus on a high knee and always be in good form. Begin to add a slight hop and a skip. This move will strengthen the hip flexors which helps to maintain the natural curve in the lower spine. It is important to pull in your lower abdomen on the exhale of the breath. Also make sure you are landing on the ground lightly. Touch opposite hand to knee. Jog backwards back to the starting line.

Deep Walking Lunges

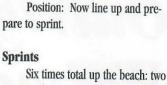
In the lunge position, you must follow the Neutral Strong Principles, i.e. do not let your knee go past your toes. Keep your abdomen in, chest up and eves lifted. Do this drill the full length of the sand. Jog backwards back to the start.

Position: Turn, face the ocean and stand in Neutral Strong Stance.

Step Crosses

Start moving sideways slowly crossing one leg in front and then

one leg in back. Pick it up to a good pace, not too fast, so as to lose form. The drill goes all the way to the end of your sand area. Then stay facing the ocean and return exercising the other side.



at 50% of your maximum, two at 80% of your maximum, one at 100% of your maximum and one at 90% of your maximum. Jog slowly up and backwards three times to return your heart to resting rate.

The Cool-down with Joint **Isolations**

Position: Return to Neutral Strong Stance and face the ocean.

Start at the feet. Lift one heel at a time 4 to 8 reps, then toe lifts one at a time (keep your knees bent) 4 to 8 reps. Hips go forward and back, then side to side, now circling equal number of times in both directions. Take three deep power breaths and squeeze your abdomen. Finish with a full body contraction. Reach your hands over your head, then slowly with a bent knee touch the sand. breathe and return to Neutral Stance.

Friendly Reminder

Summer is here. Please remember to drink water and electrolyte replacement drinks every day. Take your vitamins and keep your body cool by icing regularly. I recommend keeping ice towels available wherever needed, at work or outdoor sports.

A big thanks to our Sand Training Team, and lots of luck in the upcoming long distance canoe paddling season. Keep up the hard work.

Board Briefs

Briefs is taken from the minutes of the Board of Directors meeting on May 26, 1995 and the Executive Committee meeting on June 15, 1995.

Insurance—The Club's insurance agent reviewed the Club's insurance program. He summarized the policies and coverages, and answered questions pertaining to workers' compensation, equipment, umbrella policy, ocean marine liability, etc. The agent received a quote from Lloyd's of London for hurricane insurance for \$5 million coverage, 5% deductible. The annual premium is \$25,000. The Long Range Planning Committee will address the need for hurricane insurance. Also discussed was the possible exposure of OCC teams when traveling and if our coverage is sufficient. The agent will check into rental car insurance and auto insurance. The House Committee is reviewing the employees' group life insurance.

Vice President of Operations Report—Complaints were received about non- sanctioned athletic events. Prior arrangements were not made with management. The "post- race" celebration at the Outrigger created many problems and management was not prepared for the clean up. A letter will be sent to those responsible.

Secretary's Report—Eleven members were suspended for 15 days due to failure to pay their accounts on time. Two members were terminated for being four times delinquent.

Manager's Report-The four incomplete items within the Dining Room project were discussed. The Hau Terrace stair railing system was dry fitted and expected to be installed soon. . . The remaining three items (Hau Terrace service stand, teak podium and bus stations, and three point of sale cabinets) are being re-designed to be built within the funds remaining in the budget. . . The mockup of the recommended acoustical ceiling treatment was approved by the Executive Committee. Four custom panels are being manufactured in Colorado. Installation was planned for the first week of June. . . Snack Shop hours will be extended to 8 p.m. on Friday evenings to alleviate congestion and

disturbance of children on the Hau

Athletic Report—The new regulation by the Coast Guard requiring all vessels to have flotation devices for each passenger will be checked for updated information and clarification.

The T-shirt designs for the Masters Women crew, the Non-Run Fun Run, the summer surf contest Tshirt and the Macfarlane Regatta Tshirt were approved. . . Two new ergometers for the Fitness Center were approved at a cost of \$1,667... Due to the resignation of Buster Chapman, the Board approved Stevie Li as the new chairman of the Volleyball Committee. . . The Board approved Lyman Lacro to coach the Boys 18 volleyball team. . . The Non-Run Fun Run was approved for July 24. . . Clarification was requested on the current policy that only members can participate in Club activities including athletics. In the past, guest members were considered a class of membership making them eligible to participate and compete as part of the Outrigger team. To be considered are participation in activities and use of Club facilities, i.e. Fitness Center.

Building & Grounds
Report—Proposed plans for construction of a utility ramp were referred to the Architectural Review Committee. . . Athletics suggested B&G re-address the lighting in the Volleyball Court. . . It was requested that B&G add to the 5 Year Plan improvements to the freight elevator. . . Hank Rees Architects will be hired to design the Bar and Lounge renovation at a cost of \$17,000. . . The volleyball court fence

could not be installed as originally planned due to structural problems. The contractor will be attaching the post by drilling holes through the wall and using stainless steel bolts. This will cost an additional \$3,386 bringing the project total to \$17,334 which is \$2,334 over the budget. The additional payment was approved.

Historical Report—The committee will present more definite guidelines to follow in selecting nominees for Life Membership... The Club will pay \$300 to Susan Weinik to settle her claim of copyright infringement for the use of her picture honoring Dr. Kanahele.

Admissions & Membership Report—The Admissions Committee recommended a Bylaw amendment regarding Surviving Spouses of Senior members. Spouses assuming their deceased Senior spouse's membership would also assume Senior status should they meet the age requirement of 65 years or older. The concern on financial impact and setting of criteria was addressed and referred to the Club Comptroller for statistics. The subject will also be referred to the Bylaw committee. . . The membership count as of April 30 was 4,249.

Other—Based on its history of being a non-political Club, the Board voted not to approve honorary memberships for elected officials. . . The Acting Manager was instructed to enforce the rule on "No Outside Alcohol" being consumed on Club premises and to inform the Club Captain and Canoe Racing Committee that this rule will be strictly enforced. O
