

WORLD CHAMPION SPRINTER WILL PROBABLY BE ASKED TO HONOLULU FOR APRIL 1

Hawaiian A. A. U. Issues Official Invitation to Los Angeles Flier to Come Here for Big Athletic Carnival; Paddock Known to Be Favorable to Idea

Honolulu may see Charley Paddock, world champion sprinter, in action at the Hawaiian A. A. U. track and field meet, scheduled April 1. The scene of the meet has not been selected, but it will probably be Alexander field.

The official invitation to Paddock will probably be wireless Monday in order to give the celebrated runner ample time to decide whether or not he wants to come.

The special A. A. U. committee will meet Monday to consider the proposition from all angles.

Charley Paddock has equalled the world record for 100 yards at :09.3

and has broken a dozen other records in the short distances. He is without a peer in sprinting and he cleaned up at the seventh Olympiad in Antwerp.

Big Boost

His coming here will without doubt be one of the biggest boosts for track and field athletics that ever happened in the islands. He is known to have been favorable to the idea and wrote to George "Dad" Center, president of the Hawaiian A. A. U., last year to the effect that the idea of a trip to Honolulu appealed strongly to him.

Some weeks ago he announced that he would not run in college meets this season, which is a sore loss to the University of Southern California. He is too busy, he explained, study and working. He is connected with a Los Angeles newspaper and it is felt here that if the trip to Honolulu were offered him, the newspaper would persuade him to go in order to write special articles on the islands.

Easily

So far as the cost of the trip is concerned, the Hawaiian A. A. U. figures that the entire expenses would be under \$500 and that the gate receipts would be large enough to take care of that.

The A. A. U. committee which meets Monday noon to work on the project of bringing Paddock, and which is also working on the other plans for the April meet, includes H. E. "Bo" Wilson, C. Chang, Victor Ligda, H. N. Mosher, Wallace Saffery, R. J. Borden, J. W. Howell and August Guerrero.

This committee has issued an invitation to the other islands to send teams here. Maui is already planning a meet with the idea of getting together a team and Hilo had signified its intention to do something along the same lines.

Several Opponents

So far as competition for Paddock is concerned, Honolulu has some fast men. Clifford Melim of the Outrigger Canoe club is one of them. Besides that, there are several other promising oriental youngsters.

In the event that Paddock is unable to make the trip it is possible that the Hawaiian A. A. U. may invite Morris Kirksey of Stanford, who is Paddock's closest competitor in all the sprint distances on the coast.

HIKERS TO GO OVER TO MOLOKAI TUESDAY
