

TIES WORLD RECORD FOR FIFTY ON BACK

Warren Kealoha proved to be the shining light of last night's pentathlon swimming meet at the Y. M. C. A. tank. He not only broke two Y. M. C. A. records but as well tied the world's mark in the 50 yard backstroke, negotiating the distance in 29 seconds. In addition he swam the 75-yard distance in 37 1-5 seconds.

The fifteen men who entered the 75-yard free style and the 50-yard backstroke events, scored a total of 11,290 points, 2100 behind last year's total number for the five events.

Exhibitions

Several girls of the Outrigger club and Hui Makani gave an exhibition of fancy diving and of various strokes. Eight men divers also gave a demonstration of their skill. W. K. Simerson made the 60 foot plunge in 19 seconds.

The meet was closed by a lively pushball battle which ended with no score, and the Pake relay which brought forth the usual laughs.

Saturday evening the meet will be concluded with the remaining three events on the program being staged.

Harris, Jr., :38.4; G. Harris, :42. C. Pung, :43.4 and T. K. Silva, :46.3. Fourth heat: Sam Kahanamoku, :42.3; G. Lunning, :45 and A. Napoleon, :45.1.

The results of heats in the 50-yard backstroke with times made by each man are:

First Heat—W. Kealoha, :29; N. Kalama, :32.1 and I. Kaakamaka, :34.1. Second heat: B. Whittle, :34.3; H. Doane, :34.4; C. Q. Pang, :35 and B. Brown, :38.2. Third heat: C. Pung, :31.3; G. Harris, :33; W. Harris, :33.3 and T. K. Silva, :35.3. Fourth heat: Sam Kahanamoku, :32.1; G. Lunning, :32.4; A. Napoleon, :35.3 and W. Napoleon, :50.1.

The swimmers scored a total of 11,290 points for the two pentathlon events. The same stars will perform again in the 220-yard free style, the 50-yard under water swim and the 25 yards towing on Saturday night.
