

Many Enter Saturday's Swim Meet

Pua Kealoha Will Oppose Duke in One Event At Punahou Tank

Entries for the annual women's swimming meet, to be held next Saturday evening, are fast being turned into the Amateur Athletic Union, through the Women's Auxiliary of the Outrigger Canoe club, under whose auspices the meet is being held.

Fifteen events, four of which will be championships for men, have been listed for the swim, which is to take place in the Elizabeth Waterhouse memorial swimming tank at Punahou.

The most interesting feature of the men's events is to be the 100-yard open event for the Hawaiian championship, in which Pua Kealoha, who now holds the record, and Duke Kahanamoku, much-lauded world champ, will contest. Pua has for some time put Duke's laurels in grave danger, and there is much speculation as to whether Duke will be able to come back or not.

Both swimmers are scheduled to give Weissmuller, world champion from Chicago, a "swim for his money" in the May meet, when he will swim in Hawaiian waters for the first time.

The following are the events on Saturday's program, the name of the present record-holder and the time recorded:

50-yard novice (women), Estelle Cassidy. Time, 31 2-5 seconds.

100-yard open (men), Pua Kealoha. Time (Haw.), 54 3-5; world record, Weissmuller, 53 1-5 seconds.

Spring board, for women.

50 yards, for business women.

Plunge for distance (men), H. C. Simerson (world record).

25 yards for girls under 11.

50 yards back-stroke (women), Meriechen Wehselau (Haw.), 39 1-5; Bauer (world record), 35 3-5.

100 yards—School relay.

100 yards back-stroke (men), Warren Kealoha, 1:06 2-5.

Plunge for distance for Hawaiian championship, Josephine Hopkins, 60 feet, 10 inches.

25 yards for girls under 13.

50 yards public school (grammar grades).

50 yards breaststroke (women), K. Keliipio, 41 seconds.

200 yards men's relay—Outrigger Canoe club. Time 1:39 2-5 seconds.
