

Bill Harris May Spring Surprise On Swim Fans

Negotiates 100 and 50-Yard Distances In World's Rec- ord During Practice

THAT Bill Harris is going to spring a surprise on Honolulu swim fans is the opinion of Luther Hough, cousin and coach of the Honolulu boy.

Bill is swimming both the 100 and 50-yard distances in world record time, just five months after an operation for appendicitis and Luther who, by the way, is coaching the crew of Outrigger swimmers in their tank work, believes that the boy will spring out and do some good work.

Harris has beaten both Norman Ross and Duke Kahanamoku on two occasions and if his coach's hunch is right will either beat Weissmuller or give him a real race.

Harvey Chilton has 25 swimmers at the Punahou tank every evening and Luther Hough a raft of swimmers from the Outrigger club.

Another swimmer Hough believes will make a creditable showing is young Buster Brown, the long, angular Outrigger club boy. Brown clipped the 50 in 24 flat the other night
