

Lillie Bowmer Smashes Another Swimming Record

Lillie Bowmer again came into the foreground when she negotiated the 50-yard backstroke in 36 3-5 seconds, breaking the former Hawaiian record held by Mariechen Wehselau, in the last half of the Thurston swimming meet for girls held yesterday afternoon in the Waterhouse Memorial tank. Although this time is not official, Lillie Bowmer will, without doubt, be able to repeat when there are official timers at hand.

Miss Bowmer, who, by the way, is only a freshman in high, sprang into fame overnight when she smashed the island record for the 50-yard swim and equaled the world's record of 28 4-5 seconds for the event on last Tuesday afternoon, during the first half of the Thurston meet. That time, likewise, did not go down as official.

Island Record Shattered

Mariechen Wehselau swam the 220 yesterday in 2:51 3-5 which, although not official time, betters the island record for the event. She was pushed to her utmost throughout the race by Lillie Bowmer, who came in a close second. Lillie Bowmer will be presented later with a Waterhouse cup by the Waterhouse sisters, which is given each year to the best all around girl swimmer of Punahou. It was a great surprise to every one that a girl of the Junior academy should win the cup this year; but after seeing her swim, dive and plunge, every one

Helen Moses sprung a surprise when she captured first place in the Senior academy open, beating Mariechen Wehselau by one point. She took first in the 50-yard swim, the plunge and the diving, and second in the 100-yard, 220-yard and 50-yard backstroke. Mariechen Wehselau took first in the 100-yard, 220-yard, 50-yard backstroke and second in the plunge and 50-yard and third in the diving. Agnes Auld was third in the Senior academy open.

The Senior academy novice went to Peggy Ault, with first in the 50-yard backstroke and the dive, and second in the 50-yard and 100-yard and third in the plunge. Dora Cooke, who was second, was only a point behind Peggy Ault, while Betty Lindsay, who took third place, was only half a point behind Dora Cooke. Dora Cooke took first in the plunge, second in the diving, second in the 220-yard and third in the 50-yard front and backstrokes. Betty Lindsay took first in the 50-yard, 100-yard and 220-yard swims, second in the 50-yard backstroke, third in the dive, but only seventh in the plunge, which brought her otherwise good average down.

Takes Junior Open

Lillie Bowmer easily took the Junior academy open, taking first in every event, 100, 50 and 220-yard swims, 50-yard backstroke, the dive and the plunge. Helen Sanborn, who took second, was second in everything, except the plunge.

In the Junior academy novice, Eleanor Bickerton captured first place with first places in the 50-yard and diving and second place in the 100-yard, 220-yard and 50-yard backstroke. Dorothy Waldron was second with a first in the 50-yard backstroke, third in the 100-yard swim and the plunge, and fourth in the 50-yard and 220-yard swims. Constance Davis was third.
