

# WEISSMULLER BREAKS 100 YARD RECORD BY FIFTH OF A SECOND

Duke Kahanamoku and Pua Kealoha Who Held Jointly Mark of 53 Flat are Faded by Chicago "Human Fish" When He Swims it In a Walkaway 52 4-5 Gait; Relay Teams Show Form

**D**UKE P. KAHANAMOKU and Pua Kealoha are no longer holders of the 100-yard open water record. Last night the "human fish" Johnny Weissmuller of the Illinois Athletic club, Chicago, clipped off a fifth of a second from the Duke's mark of 53 flat. Swimming a beautiful race he was in at the finish by a good length, while Pua and Warren were fighting it out for second place, the former winning by an eyelash. At the finish Weissmuller was given a rollicking cheer by the big crowd. The race was never in doubt after the first 20 yards. Johnny took the lead and at the 50-yard mark was leading by half a length, increasing to a little more than a full length at the finish.

## Fails in 50-Yard Event

While Johnny crashed into the 100-yard record he fell by the wayside in the 50 yards, although the timers caught him while the judges decided that Pua Kealoha had won. It was the same story of that 100-yard backstroke muddle. No protest was made, however, and the race will stand. The event was swum in slow time, however, the clockers recording 23 4-5, just four-fifths slower than the record of 23 flat, held by Duke. This, by the way, is the only record that Duke still holds, since Johnny swiped the 100 yards last night.

Another record went by the boards when the Outrigger Canoe club women's relay team negotiated the 400 yards in 4:38 flat. The Hawaiian record held by the same team was 4:45 3-5 and the American senior record is 4:47, held by the W. S. A. club of New York. The Outrigger club won the event last year and now has two holds on the Lewers & Cooke shield. If they win it again next year the shield will become their permanent trophy.

## Relay Teams Make Records

A new Hawaiian record for the 400 yards junior club relay was chalked up when the Hui Nalu swimmers cut through the water at a 4:07 4-5 clip. The former Hawaiian record was 4:10 4-5, held by the Outrigger club.

In the first event of the evening a new Hawaiian record was established for the service men in the 220 when George Kane of Pearl Harbor was clocked in 2:52 3-5. The former record was held by George Campbell, 2:58, made in 1920.

Thus summing it all up, two American and Hawaiian records were broken and two Hawaiian marks. Not a bad evening's work, if we do say it.
