Outrigger Canoe Club To Start Three-Night Swim Carnival This Evening

Girls' 220-Yard Event and Warren Kealoha's Attempt for 150-Yard Backstroke Record Feature Events; Trials in Many Races Are Also On the Program

The voice of Knute Cottrell, official starter, will ring out tonight in the deathly stillness that pervades the natatorium prior to an event. He will tell the swimmers to move back a yard from the edge of the Punahou tank. Then he will bark out, "Ready?" The swimmers will step forward, poise on the starting platform and hover with muscles tense. Then will come the sharp crack of the pistol and away will go the swimmers in a whirl of foam. And the big Outrigger Canoe Club swimming meet will be on tonight at the Punahou tank. The two feature events on the program tonight are

Warren Kealoha's try for the 150-yard backstroke record and the 220-yard open water swim for women. In the latter event will be seen the two world champion swimmers from New Zealand, Gwitha Shand and Pauline Hoeft. Besides these there will be Mariechen Wehselau, Lillie Bowmer, Helen Moses and Kuaaloha Keliipio.

The committee in charge has reported everything in readiness for the opening night of the meet. The swimmers held final workouts Saturday, and everything awaits the starter's gun.

Gov. W. R. Farrington and Alexander Hume Ford, together with all the past presidents of the Outrigger Canoe Club, will occupy a special box.
