HUI MAKANI ENTRY MAKES BACKSTROKE IN 1:46.1 FOR 150

And Mariechen Wehselau Lowers Wainwright's Established Record for 220 Freestyle by Swimming it in 2:50 Flat at Outrigger Meet

Warren Kealoha of the Hui Makani and Mariechen Wehselau of the Outrigger club were joint contenders for the laurel wreath in the elimination trials of the Outrigger Canoe club swimming meet held at the Elizabeth Waterhouse memorial swimming tank last night. Warren bettered his own world record of 1:47 in the 150-yard back stroke swimming against a handicap of 11 seconds afforded by Charles Pung and 6 seconds by Kalama. He won the race by about three strokes. Kealoha was clocked at the 50 in 31 2-5 and 100 yards in 1:08.

Mariechen Wehselau distinguished herself in the trials for 220 yards with the time of 2:50 flat. The accepted world record was made by Helen Wainwright of New York in 2:52 2-5 seconds, although a somewhat garbled account of a recent race attributes the time of 2:42 to Helen Wainwright clocked at the 220 and on her way to the 400 yards. This, however, has not been accepted as yet and Mariechen Wehselau's time is likely to stand as the world's best time so far. Gwitha Shand was second in the event, touching the rope about three yards after the Honolulu girl. Helen Moses was a close third and Pauline Hoeft was fourth. Mariechen held the third lane and although she made a false start in the first attempt to get away her second start was clear and she was off the board before any of her contestants. She took the lead immediately and held it until Kunaloha Keliipio, swimming for Hilo, sprinted and beat the Honolulu girl to the 100-yard turn. Mariechen again caught the lead and kept from three to five yards ahead of the field.

Were Slowed

Both of the New Zealand girls, Gwitha Shand and Pauline Hoeft were handicapped by their inability to make the proper turns and thereby lost several seconds. Miss Shand made a desperate attempt to catch Mariechen in the 100-yard lap but failed when the island girl started to sprint.

Helen Moses, who finished third, swam a splendid race in better form than ever, while the distance seemed almost a little too much for Lilly Bowmer who had lost her race in about the fifth lap.

Lillie Bowmer of the Outrigger club won the first heat in the 50-yard free style for women in 29-3-5 seconds with Pauline Hoeft of New

Zealand second and Helen Moses and Kunaloha Keliipio trying for third place. Mariechen Wehselau won the second heat against Leilehua Judd and Gwitha Shand in 29 seconds equaling Olga Dorfner's American record of 29 seconds for tank swimming. Mariechen also holds the world record of 28-3-5 seconds jointly with Pauline Hoeft for open water.

Janice Lovett proved a star in the 100-yard event for girls under 15. She established a lead at the start and with a long, clean stroke finished about half a length ahead of her opponents establishing a time of 1:15 for the distance. Rosalie Abreu of Maui was second and Constance Davis of the Outrigger club third.

Rosalie Abreu of the Maui club won the first heat of the 50-yard event for girls under 15 in 32 2-5 seconds with Margarita Livingston of the Outrigger club second and Elizabeth Quinn of the same club third. Janice Lovett won the second heat in 1 second slower time, 33 2-5 seconds with Constance Davis second, Eleanor Bickerton third and Christine Keliipio fourth. The finals will be swum tonight.

Governor Wallace R. Farrington presented medals to the winners of the 100-yard for girls under 15, the 200 yards for women, the novice races and the race for service men. The governor was sitting in a box at the Diamond Head end of the tank with Alexander Hume Ford and W. W. Dease, former president of the Outrigger Canoe club.

Members of the Hui Nalu club furnished excellent music during the evening.
