GWITHA SHAND PUT ONE DOWN: KEALOHA NICKED ONE OTHER

New Zealander Swims 440 in 6:14 2-5; Warren Breaks His Own Record in 100 Meters in 1:12 3-5; Mariechen Sets New Fifty—0:28 4-5

GWITHA SHAND of New Zealand shattered the 440-yard free style record of 6 minutes 16 seconds by swimming the distance in 6 minutes 14 2-5 seconds in a wonderful exhibition.

WARREN KEALOHA of the Hui Makani club broke his own record of 1 minute 14 seconds in the 100-meter back stroke by doing the distance in 1 minute 12 3-5 seconds.

MARIECHEN WEHSELAU of the Outrigger club took down the long standing record of 29 seconds for the 50-yard free style when she swam it in 28 4-5 seconds.

SAM KAHANAMOKU broke the Hawaiian record for the 100 yards breast stroke in 1 minute 15 1-5 seconds. The old record was 1 minute 16 seconds.

A BRACE of world's records—an American record—and a Hawaiian record. All broken to bits—and all as a part of the second night of the Outrigger Canoe club's three-day meet.

The figurative wreaths of laurel that are supposed to deck the brows of victors the world over were distributed last night to Gwitha Shand of New Zealand, Warren Kealoha of the Hui Makani swimming club, Mariechen Wehselau of the Outrigger club, and Sam Kahanamoku of the Hui Nalu.

Gwitha Shand put over the stellar and most spectacular record-smashing exhibition of the evening when she swam a wonderful quarter mile in 6 minutes 14 2-5 seconds, thereby lowering the record of 6:16 held by Sibyl Bauer. In this race the visitor's only opponents were Helen Moses and Lillie Bowmer. Moses was second by about 10 yards, while Bowmer was, of course, third.

Gwitha took a fast pace at the start and continued throughout to the 400-yard mark, making an attempt to sprint the final 40 yards. She was not in the least winded at the finish of the race. Helen Moses took a long, even stroke and held it throughout. The quarter mile proved too much for Lillie Bowmer, but she stuck it out to the finish, touching the mark about 29 seconds after Helen Moses.

100 Meters
Warren D. Kealoha of the Hui Makani broke his own world mark in the 100-meter back stroke in the time of 1:12 3-5. His previous record for this distance was 1:14, made at the Olympiad in 1920. He was clocked at the 100 yards in 1:06.

Mariechen Wehselau stuck another feather in her cap when she swam the 50 yards in 28 4-5 seconds, breaking Olga Dorfner's tank record of 29 seconds and coming within one-fifth of a second of again equaling the open-water mark.

In this event Lillie Bowmer of the Outrigger Club pressed Mariechen all the way, finishing but two strokes behind her. Helen Moses was third. Both Gwitha Shand and Pauline Hoeft started in this event, but did not place.

Sam Stars
Sam Kahanamoku of the Hui Nalu broke Ah Kong Pang's record for the 100-yard breaststroke by by three-fifths of a second. His time was 1:15 1-5. Ah Kong Pang of Hui Nalu touched second and I. Kaakimaka, Hui Makani, third. The 50-yard men's open-water proved to be a close race between Warren Kealoha and Sam Kahanamoku. Warren won in 24 4-5 seconds. Kahanamoku was second and Bill Harris third.

In the Kamehameha-St. Louis game, which is to take place at Kamehameha field, Herman von Holt is to referee, G. Stanley McKenzie to umpire, and Lonis Steppens to be head linesman. G. B. Girdler is to act as timekeeper.

In the McKinley-H. M. A. contest, set for 1:30 o'clock at Alexander field, F. L. Bellows will referee, W. M. Anderson act as umpire and C. V. Swan take over the duties as head linesman. Dr. A. L. Andrews is to be the timer.
