

SWIMMING SPLASHES

There was a good crowd out last night to see the Outrigger Canoe club meet at Punahou tank.

The last call for 25 yards girls under 11 years was put in by Announcer Dr. Barton by 8 o'clock, even though the meet was not scheduled to start until 15 minutes later.

The crowd got a great kick out of watching the little shavers in the 25 yards for girls under 11 years.

The winner in the quarter century for kiddies was May Smith of Palama in :18.21, with Frances Spencer Bickerton second by a yard and Margaret Rath third by three yards.

Noah Kalama won the 100 yards men's free style junior event in :59.2, beating out his Hui Makani clubmate, I. Kaakimaka, by four strokes. A. K. Napoleon was a close third.

Kalama led at the 25 yards and Kaakimaka at the 50, but at the 75 yards Kalama was even again and won in the stretch.

The half century for women was one of the races that brought them all to their feet. It was a perfect start and a perfect finish.

Starter Knute Cottrell decided that beating the gun could never be charged against him, and so he taught some of the stars a lesson in the 50 yards for men.

Four times the entrants in the 50 yards men's free style fell into the tank without the gun being fired, and Starter Cottrell showed a great deal of patience.

Finally, on the fourth step-up, he pulled the trigger and they got away, but not before the gun.

Warren Kealoha turned first and won the event for the Hui Makani in :24.2, beating out Sam Kahana-moku of the Hui Nalu by a head. W. W. Harris of the Outrigger Canoe club was third.

The half century was a good race. Kahanamoku made the turn ahead of Bill Harris, but Harris almost caught up with him in the stretch, Sam making a great spurt to win by a touch.

The 100 yards men's free style junior is a new event, and Noah Kalama's time of :59.2 established a new record. The 50 yards girls under 15 years is also a new event, with the time of Janice Lovett at :32.4 being the new mark.

The half century for girls under 15 years was a thrilling number. Janice Lovett of the Outrigger Canoe club led all the way and won by a yard from M. Livingston of the same club in :32.4.

In the half century for girls under 15 years, Rosalie Abreu of Maui finished third, but was disqualified for fouling Eleanor Bickerton of the Outrigger club. Connie Davis was third in the race.

By special request, Jack Hjorth repeated the Governor's Maui special, together with some of the other diving stunts that got him a big hand.

After coming third in the 50 yards for girls under 15, Connie Davis of the Outrigger club went into the 50 yards girls' novice and won, making the distance in :33.4.

Elizabeth Rath of Palama was second and Hattie Purdy of the Hui Makani was third in the 50 yards girls' novice.

The Rath girl of Palama out-touched Hattie Purdy of the Hui Makani, the latter skating into the finish instead of going full tilt.

In the springboard diving for boys under 18 years, Clifton Mayne of the O. C. C. was first; Bouldin Burbank, a teammate, second, and Aldres Hess, also of the same club, third.

The band gave Ah Kong Pang a "pake" tune as his name was announced prior to the breaststroke race.

There was quite a heated argument as to letting Helen Moses swim in the 50 yards final, but the judges decided that she was entitled to it and that settled it.
