

# Outrigger Scores Girls' Events, While Hui Makani Takes Men's Side of It

Tank Meet Winds Up As Huge Success Despite No Records Being Broken On Final Night; Good Attendance But Expenses Heavy Showing Loss to Club

The Outrigger Canoe Club three-nights' swimming meet closed last night at Punahou tank with the Hui Makani winning the meet so far as men's events are concerned and the Outrigger Club winning in the girls' numbers. Only two Hawaiian records were broken last night and no American or world marks were touched.

In the men's events, the Hui Makani made a total of 67 points. Outrigger was second with 24 points, Hui Nalu third with 14 and Palama and unattached swimmers tied with three points each. In the women's events, Outrigger made 78 points. Palama was second with 13 points. The New Zealand swimmers made 11 points. Hui Makani girls made 10 points and Maui got six points.

## The Records

The two records last night were both in women's events. Lillie Bowmer smashed the island mark for the 50 yards backstroke by covering the ground in :36.4. The world tank record for the distance is :35.1, which gives some idea of how near Miss Bowmer came. She beat Christine Keliipio by a fair margin, while Kua'aloa Keliipio came from behind into third place.

The other record was made by Eleanor Bickerton, also an Outrigger swimmer. She did :34 flat in the 50 yards for girls under 13 years, thereby breaking Dolly Mooney's long standing mark. Eleanor nosed out Elsie Brown of Palama, who came second, and Doris Helenihi, who came third.

## The Relay

In the relay race, which concluded the meet, the Hui Makani team won, took the 200 yards junior event, making a time of 1:43.2. Isaac Kaakimaka swam the first lap for the Hui Makani and nosed out Freddie Lambert of the Outriggers by a foot. Noah Kalama gained three yards for the Hui Makani on the second lap over Clifton Mayne. In the third lap, Ernest Cook of the Outrigger tried to make it up but lost on the turn. Henry Luning of the Hui Makani beating him home by seven yards.

On the anchor lap, Keli Kanoa beat Andrew Westervelt 10 yards.

The most exciting race of the evening was the 100 yards for girls in which Pauline Hoeft of New Zealand threatened Mariechen Wehselau. Hoeft swam with a long stroke, while the local girl used her regular sprint chop. Mariechen was clocked unofficially in :29.4 for the first 50 yards of the century. She won by a narrow margin from the visitor.

## Heavy Expense

Despite the good attendance, the meet was not a financial success. However, the Outrigger Club officials expressed themselves as satisfied to have brought up the strong competition, which brought out the best in the local girls and proved them of world championship caliber.
