

HAWAIIAN A. A. U. TO AWARD ITS FISH EMBLEMS

Board Accepts Design With
Slight Addition to Help
Out Its Intended Import

Champions of Hawaii to Be
Given Privilege to Wear
Emblems On Their Suits

Just as colleges award a letter to certain athletes, the Hawaiian A. A. U., upon accepting the flying fish athletic emblem design at a meeting yesterday, decided to award the athletic emblem to island champions in various branches of sport. This is an innovation, but is expected to help in fostering athletics in the islands.

The suggestion was made by William T. Rawlins and was eagerly taken up. The contest conducted by The Star-Bulletin was merely to get an athletic emblem for wear by teams and athletes when away from Hawaii, but the Honolulu representative thought it would be a good plan to award the emblem to island champions in swimming, track and field and other athletics in order to foster the sports and give the local athletes something more to compete for besides cups and ribbons.

Each Year

The idea back of the resolution adopted is to give champions each year the emblem to wear on their jerseys or bathing suits. Each year should develop a new set of champions in this way.

Bill Harris, Outrigger swimmer who leaves for a tour of Australia and New Zealand next month, will wear the emblem, as will the basketball team which is to tour the Pacific coast in January.

Money Needed

The matter of raising money for the basketball tour was discussed at yesterday's meeting. It was decided to ask the chamber of commerce for permission to go around the business houses and solicit for subscriptions. A committee to do the soliciting will be appointed if permission is obtained from the chamber to seek subscriptions.

The athletic emblem was accepted, but it was suggested by Piercy H. Nottage that the plain letter "H" with the flying fish might be mistaken for Harvard or Hanover and that "awaii" be tacked on in smaller letters just above the tail of the flying fish.

The Columbus Welfare association was admitted to membership in the Hawaiian A. A. U.
