

INDOOR TRACK MEET IS PLANNED

A. A. U. TO HOLD FIRST IN APRIL

TO FOLLOW BIG OUTDOOR AFFAIR

Honolulu will see its first indoor track meet in the month of April if the plans of the Hawaiian A. A. U. are carried out. It was decided at the meeting of the board of managers this week to give the indoor meet idea a trial.

Indoor track meets are held in spring on the mainland because of the fact that weather conditions do not permit of holding meets in the open, but in Hawaii it is always sunshine, so that at first blush it seems foolish to hold a track meet indoors. But the promoters point out that the novelty of the idea is what will make it a success here.

The date has not been officially set, but it is hoped to hold it in the National Guard armory on April 8, one week after the A. A. U. outdoor meet is staged. H. E. Wilson and Victor Ligda are in charge of the affair for the Hawaiian A. A. U.

Banked Track

If permission can be obtained it is planned to construct banks around the turns of the track to be laid in the armory. The armory is large enough to permit of a 110-yard lap track with a 40 yards straightaway in the center. The width of the track will be nine feet on the straightaways and 10 feet on the turns.

The program for the meet has not even been tentatively arranged yet, but it is hoped to have listed under special events a high jump, a pole vault, 40 yard dash open, 40 yard dash for high school boys and 880 yards walk open.

In the relay events, open and senior, it is planned to have an 880 yard relay for four men, a mile relay for four men, a mile relay for eight men and a medley relay for eight men.

Other Events

Relays for high school students would include an 880-yard event for four men, a mile relay for eight men and a medley relay for eight men. For the grammar school athletes there would be a 440 yard relay for four men and a 40 yard dash.

The plans for the meet are still in a formative stage and Messrs. Wilson and Ligda are hard at work getting the details in the matter together. Both are exceedingly enthusiastic over the prospects and feel that among other things, the fact that it is the first indoor meet ever held in Hawaii will aid in putting it across with a bang.
