

Beamer Out Of Furlong Race Today

Did Not Run in Trials
Held Yesterday
Afternoon

Tickets of today's track meet will be on sale at Dawkins, Benny Company until noon today. All bleacher seats are reserved and standing room will also be provided.

PAUL RICE of Kauai will be seen in the 220 yards dash this afternoon at Kam field.

Milton Beamer, who placed in the first trial heat of the furlong, dropped out of the race, when it was staged yesterday afternoon. Only three runners started at the crack of the gun—Tarleton, Rice and Penhallow. All three runners paced down the field in slow motion to the great disappointment of the large number of spectators present.

Coach Klum of the Deans was well satisfied with the results of the trials in the 220 event. He placed all four men, Tarleton, Tin Luke, Penhallow and Ralph Ault being the quartet. Paul Rice is the only other island athlete to get a show in the finals today, the other man being Morris Kirksey of the Olympic Club.

This afternoon a big crowd is expected to be present when the first event is called at 1:30 sharp. The track will be a bit heavy due to the light showers that poured last night. That there will be no fast time made in the track events is seen by many local followers of the sport.

Visitors Lead

Out of a possible 183 points in the whole meet, the three visiting runners are expected to take away 55 units, or 11 first places. Krogness should register 15, two hurdles and the high jump; Merchant at least 25 by taking all the field events, while Morris Kirksey should cinch 15 points in the 100, 220 and 440 yard dashes.

The rest of the score will be divided among the two best teams, University of Hawaii and Palama Settlement. Palama seems to have the best chance of winning the races today. The Pals are strong in the field events, and there are enough men to win second, third and fourth places in the meet to win the cup.

The University of Hawaii should come in second with a score close to the Pals. The Deans are weak in the field events and the distance runs. In the dashes and the half-mile relay they are very strong.

Palama expects to win the mile walk, the two-mile run and the one-mile grind with at least eight points to each event. Outrigger will be well represented in the pit events. The A. C. A. may place a man in the half-mile run with Ah Hop of Mills wearing the green and gold jersey.

Hawaiian records in most of the field events are going to fall, if Merchant does not let anything ail him today. Whether Krogness can smash the high-jump record remains to be seen. The pole-vault mark should stay with the present holder, Elisha Andrews, at 11 feet 8 inches.

The best two races have been picked by many, they being the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Then there are a few who think that "Dog" May of Punahou might nose Kirksey out in the quarter-mile affair. All told, the meet this year should be one of the best ever staged in the annals of A. A. U. track and field games in Hawaii.
