

Borg To Race Warren, S. Kahanamoku Today In Quarter Mile Swim

Four Feature Events Billed on This Afternoon's
Swim Card at Harbor; Kirschbaum to
Try for Breaststroke

THIS afternoon at 2:30 o'clock Arne Borg of Sweden will battle with the Hawaiian swimming stars in the 400 meters. Borg will attempt to lower the world record—5:06.2—made by Johnny Weismuller here in 1922. Weismuller at present holds the tank record at 4:51.2, but it will be obviously impossible for Borg to touch this record in open water.

In the light of Borg's sensational victory yesterday, it is expected that the Norse star will have little difficulty in winning from the local field. His greatest asset is his endurance, however, and unless he gets a good lead at the last turn, either Warren Kealoha or Sam Kahanamoku may edge him.

Warren was beaten by less than a lap yesterday, in a race which is far outside of the Hui Makani star's regular dish. In the 440 yards Warren has proved himself among America's best, and it is possible that he may give the Swede some stiff competition.

Sam Kahanamoku is an unknown factor. Sam should be capable of doing the distance close to record time, but whether he is seasoned enough to stand the grind cannot be determined. If he is in good condition today, he ought to be close to Borg at the finish.

THREE OTHERS

Three other events of more than local prominence are scheduled on this afternoon's bill. The 200 meters breaststroke is on, and Bill Kirschbaum is going to attempt to get close enough to record time in this to prove that he is a necessary part of the American Olympic team.

The century for women will also be featured, in which Mariechen Wehselau will be the main light. She will have to swim against Helen Moses and Janice Lovett, and either is capable of pressing Mariechen hard at the finish.
