Another hot day greeted the swimmers yesterday in the Hawaiian Olympic swimming meet in the harbor.

Three Navy boats anchored in the outer end of the slip added to the gayety of the occasion.

The crowd was slow in coming and less than half of the stands were filled when 1:30 p. m. drew around.

Arne Borg appeared at the meet in white flannels, white sweater and a brilliant knitted skiing cap.

Janice Lovett was scratched in the 100 meters, but decided to swim after all.

Nobody expected a close race in the century meters backstroke for women, but Dot Waters beat Janice Lovett by a scant foot.

The 100 meters for men was one of the most exciting of the afternoon.

Hunt got a late start in the 50 meters for service men and was unable to catch up. Underwood won, but would have done better time if he had swum straight.

Though Maude Kishler won the 25 yards for girls under 11, Frances Bickerton swam a much straighter course.

The crowd got quite a laugh when Frances Bickerton coughed hoarsely upon finishing her race.

They touched one-two-three, just as fast as one can count, in the 100 meters service breaststroke.

The Olsen boys took the honors in the breaststroke and fought it out all the way on the homestretch. Carol beat Ervin to the touch.

All the entries but one were scratched in the 50 meters women's breaststroke novice and Henrietta Kishler swam against time.

Needless to say, Henrietta won the race. It is a new event, so she established a record.

The 400 meters for women was interesting because of the fight between Pauline Laird and Janice Lovett for third place.

Pauline Laird was second to turn at the first 50 and third at the 100. At the 200 Janice turned before Pauline and held it to the 350 mark. On the home stretch Pauline nosed her out.

Mariechen Wehslau won the race, finishing about 25 meters ahead of Helen Moses, who finished that much ahead of Pauline Laird.

Borg won the 200 meters free style for men by 15 meters with Sam Kahanamoku that much ahead of George Harris.

The time was 2:19.2, which is a bit above the world record of 2:15.3 held by Johnny Weissmuller.

Dorothy Waters was the only entrant in the 200 meters breast stroke for women, so she swam against time.

Harry Field beat the field in the 50 meters for boys under 13 years.
