

KAHANAMOKU IN THRILLING RACE

Reggie Harrison Ties Duke in Olympic Trials

Mariechen - Wehselau Stages Neat Exhibition

Good Crowd Sees Finals of Tryouts at Pasadena

Man, oh, man, what a race Duke Kahanamoku and Reginald Harrison swam at the wind-up of the Olympic tryouts at Pasadena yesterday! Surging through 110 yards of water in the 100-meter free style swim neck and neck all the way, Duke and the youngster from the Venice High School reached the finish rope at precisely the same instant, in probably the greatest dead heat finish Southern California has ever seen. The time of 1m. 2s., gives an idea of the rate at which they were traveling. It will be a long time before swim fans will find a thrill to equal it.

The last day of the Olympic final tryouts went off in one-two-three order and a fair sized crowd inhabited the Brookside Park plunge bleachers and watched the festivities which were under the direction of the Pasadena Athletic and Country Club.

Thelma Finn and Olive Hatch put up a pretty battle in the girls' 100-meter race, Thelma winning the affair with Olive a good second.

Frank Holborow's new swimming club made its debut in the 100-meter affair and the veteran coach's entry, Dodie Bluett, swam a good third to Miss Finn and Miss Hatch.

David Kahanamoku, brother of Duke, and Mariechen Wehselau, the world champion from Honolulu, put on an exhibition for the edification of the populace and all in all, "a good time was had by all."
