

# New Westervelt Tank Opened at Nuuanu "Y" With Snappy Splashes

Wood of Central "Y" Stars in Final Night of Meet:  
Large Crowd Attends Dedication and  
Rain Fails to Halt

**D**ESPITE a slight drizzle that at times interrupted the evening's program, the dedication swimming meet at the Nuuanu Y.M.C.A. last night, to open the new Westervelt tank, was a complete success.

Twelve events were run off, completing a two-night schedule of 24 events, and more than a hundred swimmers of Honolulu, of all ages, participated. Races in four classes were held, giving everyone a chance to compete in his own class of swimmers.

Wood of the Central "Y" was the individual star of the meet, capturing the century crawls in the senior and class A divisions and also taking the 50 yards breaststroke, class A and coming second in the half-century supine, class A.

It was a big night for Wood, but his stamina did not lag, and in his final race, the 100 yards crawl, senior, he stepped out in :58.3, beating his time of the night before.

Maude Kishler was the shining light among the girls, the diminutive Outrigger star taking first place in the 50 yards breaststroke novice, and also the half-century novice women's freestyle swim, winning both races from a field of fast swimmers.

Bill Jones of the Hui Makani club did his stuff on the springboard, winning the open event handily. Ernest Cooke won the open plunge, while Wright took the senior plunge.

The meet was well attended, despite the rain, and the crowd stuck through to the end. The races were all closely contested, and the meet was well handled. Following is the summary of events:
