

SIXTY CHAMPION SWIMMERS HERE WEDNESDAY NIGHT AT THE RUTGERS COLLEGE POOL

The greatest swimming team ever assembled for an Olympic competition will be seen in competition in the Rutgers College pool on Wednesday night. America's representatives, who will compete in Paris next month, include twenty-four girls and thirty-five men, the pick of this country, the Panama Canal Zone and the Hawaiian Islands. Most of these will display their extraordinary ability in the Rutgers pool before what is expected to be a large and representative audience.

The men's team will be headed by Johnny Weissmuller of the Illinois A. C., acknowledged to be the greatest swimmer in the world. He, in company with his coach, left Chicago at noon today on the Broadway Limited, according to a telegram received by Lester C. Stevens today and he will appear here on Wednesday night.

The girls' contingent will include Miss Sybil Bauer of Chicago, who broke her own world's record in the 100 meter backstroke at Briarcliff Manor yesterday; and Miss Gertrude Ederle of New York, the greatest all around swimmer in the world. Yesterday in the tryouts she established a new world's record in the special 150 meter free style event, contested for the first time in this country.

Among the girl divers will be Aileen Riggan of New York; Elizabeth Becker of Atlantic City; Caroline Smith of Cairo, Ill.; Alma Mann of Canal Zone, Carol Fletcher of Pasadena and Helen Meany of New York. Among the girl competitors here also will be Miss Marie Chen Wehselau of the, Outrigger Canoe Club of Honolulu.

Seven male swimmers of the Hawaiian Islands will also be here, including Duke Kahanamoku,

Man Killed and Two Injured in Newark Accident

NEWARK, June 9.—One man was killed and two others seriously injured when a carload of piles they were unloading fell on them due to the breaking of supports holding the timbers on the car. The accident happened at the Pennsylvania Railroad siding at the new Public Service power plant on the Harrison Turnpike and the Hackensack River.

Louis Wisman, of Newark, was crushed to death; Francis Tomas of New Brunswick received a punctured muscle contusions and lacerations. The two injured men were taken to St. Francis Hospital Jersey City.

The piling is being used in laying foundations for the power plant on the Hackensack meadows.
