

WEISSMULLER WINS CHILLY SWIM RACE

Olympic Aquatic Team Holds Farewell Meet in Biting Waters of L. I. Sound.

John Weissmuller, Robert Skelton and Miss Sybil Bauer of the Illinois A. C. of Chicago and Miss Mariechen Wehseleau of Honolulu were the outstanding performers at the farewell water carnival for the American Olympic swimming team, conducted by the Westchester Biltmore Country Club at Rye, N. Y., yesterday afternoon.

Competing over a 50-meter course in Long Island Sound, with the water bitterly cold and the tide so low that the contestants would touch bottom anywhere, Weissmuller won the 100-yard free style sprint in 1:00 2-5, sterling time for the conditions, and defeated by four and five yards Duke Kahanamoku of the Los Angeles A. C. and Sam Kahanamoku of Honolulu.

Skelton achieved a remarkable feat in capturing the 200-meter breast stroke race in 2:59 2-5, despite the adverse conditions. He led home by wide margins, his team-mate John Faricy and William Kirschbaum, of Honolulu. Faricy took second place in 3:07.

Miss Bauer won the 50-meter back stroke event for women notwithstanding a mishap. Ten yards from the line her feet struck a sunken rock and she stopped. But she was off again in a flash and beat Miss Aileen Riggan of the Women's S. A. in 0:40 flat.

Miss Wehseleau won the 50-meter free style dash for women. She thrashed the distance in 0:31 2-5. But Miss Ethel Lackie of the Illinois A. C. also displayed fine pace, finishing second, a scant three feet behind.

The 100-meter dorsal swim for men was marred by the erratic course followed by Warren Kealoha of Honolulu, world record holder. He drove the field into one corner on the first lap and unwittingly kept them pinned against the side line. Gay Harris of Honolulu was in the lead three yards from home, but there he crashed into one of the bordering floats. Kealoha won the event in 1:19 2-5. Henry Luning, also of Honolulu, was a very close third.

Miss Agnes Geraghty of the Women's S. A. easily captured the 100-meter breast stroke for women. Her little club-mate, 13-year-old Matilda Schurich, finished second. Miss Geraghty's time was 1:37.

Lester Smith of the Olympic Club probably lost the 500-meter free style swim for men through miscalculating the laps. Smith stopped at 400 meters with a clear lead, thinking he had finished. When he realized the mistake he tried vainly to overtake his opponents. Wallace O'Connor of Venice, Cal., won in 7:02 4-5, with Adam Smith of Erie, Pa., second, beaten by inches.

A 200-meter mixed relay swim, two girls and two men on each team, went rather easily to a foursome made up of Miss Wehseleau and Sam Kahanamoku of Honolulu, Miss Norrellus of Jersey City and Duke Kahanamoku. The latter, as anchor man, took the fast relay against Weissmuller. The time was 1:57 1-5. The summary:

BIG FELLOWS AT VELODROME.

Heavyweights will hold the center of the stage this week in boxing circles, the weekly card at the New York Velodrome having five matches made up of big fellows with two twelve-rounders, featuring Jack Renault and Andy Schmader of Omaha, will top the card, with Joe Stoessel and Quentin Romeo meeting in the first twelve round bout.

Leo Flynn is starting a campaign which he hopes will land Renault in the ring with Wills, Firpo or Dempsey, but is having a tough time finding opponents for his Canadian contender. If Flynn can get nothing better, he will permit Renault to go on the same card with Wills and Firpo, the match which will likely be closed this week. It is the intention of Tex Rickard to put on the winners of three heavyweight shows in the preliminaries to the big bout at Boyle's Thirty Acres.

Tom Fahy, manager of Joe Stoessel, the Italian heavy, thinks he has another Willard in Joe. He points to the fact that Joe has had more experience to date than Jeffries, Corbett or Willard had before they broke into fast company, and all three eventually won the title. Stoessel has had ten professional battles, winning six of them via the knockout route, drawing three times and winning one decision. He will face a tough, willing boxer in Romeo, who is expected to show much better form this time than he did against Floyd Johnson, and he did not disgrace himself on that occasion, his first start in this country.

In a six-rounder, Leo Gates and Jim Maloney, of Boston, will meet. In the opening four-rounder, Joe Silvani will meet Paddy Murphy, of Brooklyn, while Jack Middleton, of Florida, and Carl Johnson, of the Swedish-American A. C., will meet in the cthey four.
