CHILTON SCORES A. A. U. HANDLING OF TEAM'S TRIP

For Olympic Swimmers; About \$3000 Is Needed

Harvey Chilton, trainer of the Hawalian Olympic swimming team, returned to Honolulu today on the steamer Manoa, o'genly dissatisfied with the manner, in which the plans for the trip, of the team to Europe and the Olympic games have been carried, out.

"The A. A. U. which bucked Lloyd Conkling and myself should now get busy and obtain some money for the members of the team." Chilton said, in an interview aboard the Manoa. "Now that I'm back in Honolulu, something ought to be done for the boys."

Chilton decler es that the members of the team at present stand in need of approximately \$3000. He says that he returned to Honolulu because of lack of funds to continue on.

When the members of the team sailed for Europe, he continues, there was pot sufficient money on hand to p archase them sufficient clothing for the trip. He says that Conkling spent money from his own pocket to help the team memoers out of their predicament.

Some of the measures of the team, according a to children, were compelled to write to relatives in Honolulu for money is a order that they could obtain sul, able clothing and other things secessary for the trip. The parents of one of the boys sent \$75, Chilton added.

Accepting to Chilton, Gay Harris was the only member of the team who failed in the trials, and he acted that if he could have given him another month of trainig, Harris vyould have gotten through successibility. Six Hawalian swimmers have gone to the Olympic games. Chilton said.
