

ISLAND MARKS CLIPPED OFF AT KAM FIELD AS PALS CRASH TO A WIN

Sensational Showing of Islanders Yesterday Excels Past Performances on the Cinder Path

ISLAND RECORDS WHICH FELL AT TRACK MEET YESTERDAY

TRACK

One-mile walk, won by James Smith, Y.M.C.A.; time, 8.00.1. The former record was made by W. H. Meinecke, Palama; time, 8:04.2.

Two-mile run, won by William Coelho, Hui Makani; time, 10:59.2. The former record was held by Coelho at 11:01.

FIELD

Pole vault, won by Dick Gartley, Outrigger Canoe club; height, 12 feet, 10 3-4 inches. The former record was made by E. S. Andrews in 1914; height, 11 feet, 8 3-4 inches.

High jump, won by Milton Carter of Hilo; height, 5 feet, 11 3-4 inches. The former record was made by George Lindlay in 1918; height, 5 feet, 10 3-4 inches.

Javelin throw, won by William Wise, University of Hawaii; distance, 161 feet, 10 inches. The former record was made by Coombs in 1918; distance, 148 feet, 3 inches.

PALAMA again swept the annual Hawaiian A.A.U. track and field championships, winning from the University of Hawaii at Kamehameha field yesterday by a score of 60 to 31. Hui Makani was third, Central Y.M.C.A. fourth and the Outrigger Canoe club and All-Around Chinese trailed in the rear. Five Hawaiian records were smashed.

For the fourth consecutive year the Maroon cinder stars carried the meet by a sweeping majority, placing in nearly every event and piling up their biggest scores in the field and pit.

The most startling performance at yesterday's meet was the high jump record set by Milton Carter of Hilo. The Big Island champion sailed over the bar at 5 feet 11 3-4 inches, and barely missed making it 6 feet 1 inch.

Bill Wise of the University, with his javelin throw of 161 feet 10 inches made at the trials last Thursday, ranks first among the new title holders. Wise's performance ranks him as a possible candidate for the national Olympic tryouts.

John Watt, former Olympic hurdler, sliced the Hawaiian record in the 120 yards high hurdles, and came within a short distance of touching the world record in this event, clipping the fences in :15.3. The former record was :16.1, Watt's own time. He was closely pressed by "Lefty" Sproul of Schofield.

CLOSE RACE

Castanha won the mile race in a thrilling race with Scoville, Marine runner. The time was 1:47 flat, with two seconds of the island record. Scoville led nearly the whole way and was only beaten out in the sprint for the tape. Castanha was awarded the Benton Trophy for 1924.

Bernard Farden won the century dash in :10.1, in one of the closest finishes seen here. Penhallow of the University, Kenneth Auld, a University runner competing unattached, and Asao of Palama were all bunched at the tape.

Dick Penhallow took his revenge when he kicked cinders into the eyes of the rest in the furlong, winning in :22.4. Penhallow proved himself to be undoubtedly the fastest 220 man in the islands yesterday, winning the relay for the University on the strength of his fast clip for the tape. He was timed

Wills Meets Firpo Soon: Tex Rickard

NEW YORK, March 29.—Tex Rickard announced this afternoon he had signed Harry Wills, negro heavyweight, to meet either Louis Firpo, Andrew Spalla or L. Rojas in a bout to be held in June or July. It was agreed, Rickard said, that if Wills wins this encounter, he would be matched with Jack Dempsey, the champion, in September. Both Spalla and Rojas, while in America, will appear under Rickard's auspices, it was announced.

It was reported Wills had accepted the offer on a percentage basis.

The mile walk was another record that fell at yesterday's meet, Jimmy Smith of the Y. M. C. A. lowering Bill Meinecke's mark of 8:04.4 to 8.00.4, after a stiff race with Walter Scott, former island walking champion. Scott led the first two laps and Smith jumped ahead in the third and stuck to the margin, winning by a scant three yards. Meinecke was third.

GIRL CHAMP

Clara Maertens, island girl champion, defended her title successfully against competition, again winning the 60-yard dash for women. Her time was :08.1. Agnes Auld was second.

Jim Landers, University runner but also competing unattached, brought the crowd to its feet in a thrilling sprint for the tape in the quarter mile run, forging to the front in the last 20 yards and winning by two yards from Fred Miller of the Hui Makani Club. Herbert Deverill, who was booked to win, ran himself out in the first part of the race and wilted at the end.

Bill Coelho of the Hui Makani Club lowered his own island record for the two-mile run, jogging the distance in 10:59.3, and winning easily from Saunders of the Navy.
