

SCHOOLS ENTER 28 FOR SWIM GO SUCCESS LIKELY TO BE PRESENT TRIALS CARDED THURSDAY NIGHT

Honolulu public schools will be represented by a total of 28 swimmers in the third Hawaiian swimming meet for women which is scheduled for Saturday night at the Central Y. M. C. A. tank. The entry books for the meet closed early this week and found that there were 13 swimmers from Pohukaina, 10 from the Normal school, four from Central Grammar and one from McKinley High school. Never before in the history of the Mermaid swimming meet in Honolulu have the public school girls entered in such numbers. This bodes well for the success of the Saturday meet.

In the public school 40 yard race a total of 18 girls have entered. These girls are not members of any of the local swimming clubs. Mrs. E. Fullard-Leo, secretary of the Hawaiian A. A. U., originated this race at the first mermaid meet in 1917.

Greatest Number

Pohukaina school seems to be taking the greatest interest in the meet. This is the school that de-

veloped Julia Kehia, now swimming for Palama. Pohukaina has five entries in the 20 yards for girls under 13 years. There is a total of 15 entries for this race which should see a great scramble for honors between Dolly Mooney and Cecily Cunha of the Outrigger club and Elsie Brown and Elizabeth Rath of Palama.

There are 12 entries for the plunge for distance and five entries for the 40 yards business girls' race. There are eight babies entered in the 20 yards for girls under 11 years. The entries for the diving exhibition are Lily Bowmer, Dorothy Waters and Christine Smoot. In the 40 yards backstroke, Josephine Hopkins, Helen Moses, the Auld girls and Julia Kehia will perform.

Coming Down

Rose Robero, former Palama star, is coming all the way from the Puu-waawaa ranch on Hawaii to swim in the 40 yards backstroke for her club. In the springboard diving, Mariechen Wehselau, Helen Moses, the Auld girls and the Kelelpio girls from Hilo will perform. Incidentally the two Hilo girls are entered in several other events. Kuualoha will take part in the Swanzy cup competitions while Christine will swim in the 100, the 50 backstroke and the diving.

Four men, Harold Kruger, Bill Harris, Warren Kealoha and Sam Kahanamoku are entered in the 50 yards senior indoor national.
