Sports Win Again

Surfers Win Island Champ From Hilo In Final Round

The Outrigger basketball team, veterans of many seasons and runners-up in the Honolulu championship series, won additional laurels at the National Guard armory Saturday evening by defeating the Hilo aggregation by a score of 46 to 26 in the final game of the series for the championship of the territory.

The melee was one of the fastest ever played on a local floor and was marked with excellent teamwork, coupled with individual starrng by members of both teams. The first half was especially fast and neither team was more than three points ahead of the other at any time during the first two quarters. The Hiloites opened the game with a flash and an exhibition of teamwork which seemed to bewilder the local boys. The ball was in Hilo's hands practically all of the time during the first five minutes and close guarding on the part of the entire Outrigger team was all that saved them from having a big lead to overcome.

The canoe men led in the first quarter with the score of 7-6. In the second frame Hilo did their best work and pretty passing and good teamwork brought them to the fore. Score at half, Hilo 20, Outrigger 17.

"Skeeter" Swans stepped into the limelight beginning the third quarter and with a burst of speed and accuracy the canoe men's quintet drew away from the Hiloites. The period ended with Outrigger leading 33 to 20, Outrigger continued to gain heavily in the last quarter and when time was called, had piled up a score of 46-26.

Alerts and Wacs Win First Games Of Champion Play

Two Fast Games Mark Opening of Title Tournament Before Well Filled Gallery of Fans

Wacs and Alumni Alerts were victors over Lahainaluna and L. A. A. on the first night of the Maui basketball championship play. A good crowd of enthusiastic fans turned out to witness the games and their unanimous verdict when they left the local gym was that they had surely gotten their money's worth of good sport.

The Alerts and L. A. A. opened the tournament. The Lahaina champs won the toss and the teams were off. In the first minute or two of play the West Maui team caused a wave of surprise to sweep over the supporters of the St. Anthony quintet by dropping the ball through the net twice in quick succession. After the one outburst of speed, however, their pace was gradually slowed and the Alerts drew steadily away.

The Game

On the first play Takatsura dropped the ball through the hoop and drew a round of applause from the West Maui fans. Silva was charged with a personal foul and Wong failed to convert but ran in after the throw and shot a basket from directly below it. More cheers, Sequeira broke the ice for the Alerts and Kahoohanohano duplicated the stunt tying the score. Alerts fouled and Lindsay failed to convert. Score at first quarter 4-4.

Fast playing and pretty work by the guards of both teams marked the opening moments of the second frame. West Maui fouled but Hangai failed on the free throw. Alerts fouled and Lindsay missed the hoop. It was a double foul and Shige missed again. Neither team was able to convert fouls and missed many chances to score. A technical foul was called on Wong and Hangai succeeded as a point getter. Kahoohanohano shot from the center of the field and hit the basket dead center, at the same time he smashed into the wall and suffered an injured knee but continued in the game. Shige scored a field goal and Wong converted a foul for L. A. A. Score at half time Alerts 9, L. A. A. 5.

During the half intermission, C. A. Fack presented the St. Anthony Minutemen with the pennant emblem of the Midget league championship.

In the last half the Alerts faster pace and heavier weight began to tell on the Lahaina team and the East Maui champions drew steadily away from their opponents. Lindsay failed to convert a foul, Hamai scored from the field. Sequeira scored for Alerts and Kahoohanohano shot a field goal. Lindsay converted and Shige failed in two attempts. Kahoohanohano dropped the ball again through the hoop as the third quarter came to an end. Score Alerts 15, L. A. A. 8.

The last frame opened with the Alerts on their toes. Sequeira and Kahoohanohano scored from the field. Alerts failed to convert a free toss. Silva was automatically expelled from the game, having four personal fouls charging against him. He went up in the gallery and a lively fistic duel ensued between him and Rodrigues the Wacs captain. Continuing the game, Lindsay scored from the foul and Shige heaved one in the net from the field. Lindsay scored the last point, converting a free toss. Final score Alerts 21, L. A. A. 10.

Wacs Victorious

Wacs and Lahainaluna played one of the cleanest games yet seen on the local gym floor. Superiority in shooting brought the bacon home for the Wailuku team although the Lahaina aggregation showed a brand of passing and team work that outclassed that of the victors. The West Maui lads were apparently siezed with stage fright and missed many attempts at shooting that looked like sure baskets.

Summary

Lahainaluna won the toss and play was started. Cummings got the ball and blocked in front made a backward toss over his head, the casaba finding the net for the first score. Rodrigues made a brilliant shot from a bad angle but succeeded in scoring. Kalawai failed at a free toss and Sniffen attempted to convert a second foul but failed also. Kalawai converted a foul on his second attempt. Cummings failed at a free try. Score at first quarter, Wacs 4, Lahainaluna 1.

Lahainaluna showed a burst of speed in the second frame. Kalawai failed at two attempted free throws and Cummings dropped the ball through the hoop for the Wacs. Keaku failed to convert. Had the West Maui team been able to convert their many free throws given them their score would have been much greater. Sniffen secured a basket for Lahainaluna and Keaku converted a foul to goal. Score at half, Wacs 6, Lahainaluna 4.

Souza and Keaku both failed to score on free throws. Kalawai dropped the ball through the net. Both teams missed several attempted baskets but Souza finally found the hoop. Rodrigues scored from the field. Third quarter Wacs, 10, Lahainaluna 6.

The last frame saw the Wacs draw away from the Lahainaluna quintet. The West Maui team seemed unable

to score and failed at nearly every attempt at a basket or free throw. Rodrigues opened the last frame scoring a basket and Cummings duplicated the performance. Souza dropped the casaba in the net from a difficult angle and Keaku made the last score of the game converting a foul. Final score Wacs 16, Lahainaluna 7.

Next Play Thursday

The second set of games in the tournament will be played on Thursday night at the Lahaina Armory. Wacs meet the L. A. A. and the Alerts meet Lahainaluna. West Maui followers predict victory for their teams when given the advantage of their home floor. There will be one more round played at Wailuku.
