### Japan Volleyball Trip for UH

The University of Hawaii women's volleyball team will tour Japan Aug. 15-30, playing many of the top Japanese college teams and working with Japanese coaches, it was announced yesterday by women's Athletic Director Dennis Thompson. Nippon College, Japan's intercollegiate champion, will play the Wahines in Hawaii in 1980, said Dr. Thompson, who arranged the UH tour during a recent visit to Japan.

The University of Hawaii Wahines' basketball team will play the Okanagan College Lakers of British Columbia tonight and tomorrow night at Klum Gym. Tip-off time for each game is 7 o'clock. The UH women, who dropped a season-opening series to Utah State last week, are paced by returnee Mary Kay Simpson, transfer Renee McKnight and freshman Sandy Markarian.

### OCC Inaugurates New Race

The boats and courses have been changed but the competition remains the same—fierce—for the newly inaugurated Waikiki Ocean Paddleboard race Saturday at the Kaimana Hotel.

The race will have a division for women as well as men and a perpetual trophy will be awarded which will bear the names of the first man and woman finishers. In addition, trophies will be presented to the first three finishers in both the men's and women's divisions.

Paddleboarders will find only two specifications—a maximum overall length of 12 feet and a minimum weight of 20 pounds.

The course, meanwhile, has changed to adopt standard race distance of 10,000 meters (approximately 6.21 statute miles) open ocean, closed course beginning and ending at Sans Souci Beach and will include rounding Diamond Head and Wreck Buoys.

Starting time is 10:30 a.m. at the beach fronting the Kaimana Hotel. Entries must be in by 9:30 the day of the race. Race director is Don Mailer, who can be contacted at 538-6911 or at 923-1585.

# Council to evaluate golf course needs

An ad hoc committee identified as the Honolulu City Golf Council has been organized by the Board of Public Parks and Recreation, City and County of Honolulu.

Frank Haffner, co-chairman, said the purpose of the Council is to evaluate the present operations and conditions of four city and county golf courses and compile recommendations on improvement needs. The four city municipal golf courses are the Ala Wai, Pali, Ted Makalena and Kahuku.

Haffner added that this action will be a part of Honolulu Mayor Frank Fasi's on-going program to provide the public with quality recreation and park facilities. The first public forum will be held Thursday, 7:30 p.m. at the Waipahu Recreation Park Pavilion. Golfers who use the Ted Makalena Course facilities are invited to attend and express their feelings as to problems they face at the 18-hole course and in the use of clubhouse facilities. They are also invited to offer suggestions and recommendations relative to improvements they would like to see incorporated.

Subsequent forums will be announced for the Ala Wai, Pali and Kahuku golfers to be held during January and February of 1979. The Council consists of contractors, an architect, a landscape architect, a professional golfer and grounds superintendent, a business management specialist, an educator, a supplier and a property management specialist. They will serve on a voluntary basis.

Members of the Council are Robert M. Kaya and Albert C. Kobayashi, general contractors; Walter Nagorski, pro golfer and U.S. Army Hawaii Support Command Golf Course Maintenance Superintendent; Edward A. Jurkens, businessman; Dr. Patrick Takahashi, Associate Professor, University of Hawaii.

Also, Gerald Tokuno, architect; Wayne K. Iwamoto, landscape architect; Clarence Tam, president, Pacific Garden Center and Hawaii Public Links Golf Association, and H. Frank Haffner, property management specialist.

### Paddleboard races set

The first annual Waikiki Ocean Paddleboard Race, sponsored by the Outrigger Canoe Club, will be held Saturday starting at 10:30 a.m. at the beach fronting the Kaimana Beach Hotel.

(Another race, the Diamond Head

Paddleboard Race, will be held tomorrow starting at 10 a.m. at the Moana Hotel. The distance will be approximately 5 miles in three board classes — open, stock and surfboard. The Waikiki Surf Club is the sponsor.

There will be a division and trophies for men and women, in a sport usually dominated by men. A perpetual trophy will bear the name of the first male and female finishers and trophies will be presented to the three finishers in each division.

There will be a few changes in this race as compared to those in the past. Only one class of board will be used with these specifications — a maximum overall length of 12 feet and a minimum weight of 20 pounds. No rudder or moveable device will be allowed.

The closed course will be 10,000 meters (6.214 statute miles) — the world-wide adopted standard distance — beginning and ending at Sans Souci beach. The course will run around Diamond Head buoys.

Entries must be received at the Outrigger Canoe Club, 2909 Kalaheo Ave., by mail or delivery by 9:30 a.m. on race day. Boards will be inspected before the race, from 9:30 to 10:15. There is no entry fee.

### CYO Comets' celebration

The event will be primarily for the 40 softball players who performed on several different Comet teams during 1978.

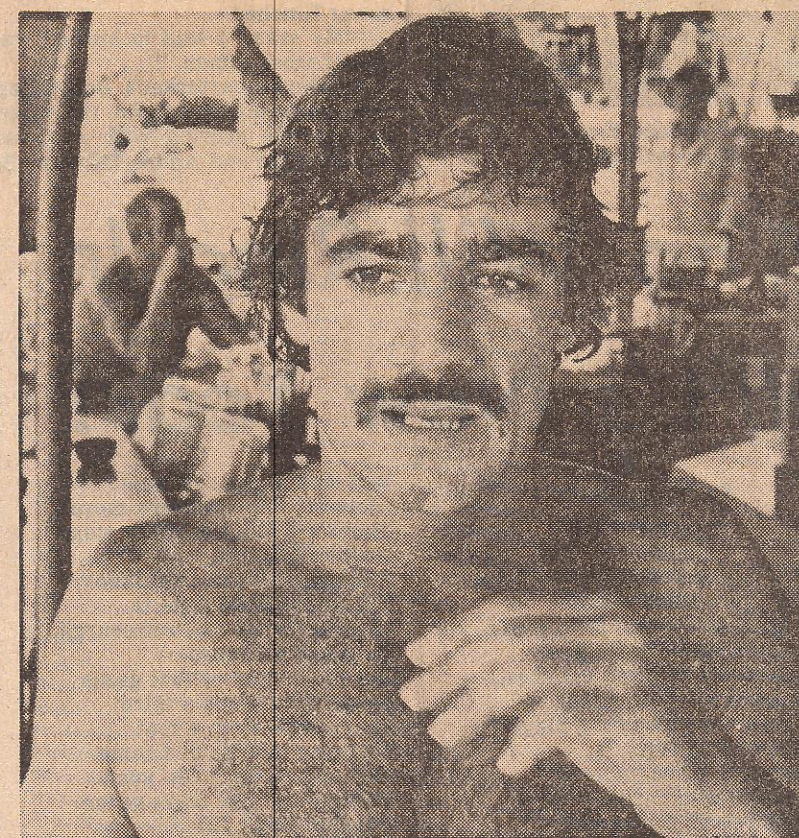
Lyndell Lindsey, co-captain of the University of Hawaii at Hilo women's volleyball team that finished second in the nation, will be the keynote speaker.

# Goodfriend Captures WSC Paddleboard Title

"I didn't dare look back for fear of missing a stroke," said Bret Goodfriend, winner of Waikiki Surf Club's annual Diamond Head Paddleboard Championships that was held in calm waters off Waikiki Beach yesterday.

"As it was I got squeezed at the start and bumped my arch-rival, Kiki Spangler, a few times," he added. "It was close at the first turning mark, but then, while getting pressed by Chuck Kelley, I poured it on from Diamond Head buoy to Waikiki. It felt like a sprint rather than a well-planned race. I need a drink. See any beer?"

Goodfriend, a 23-year-old professional surfer and surfboard builder, led from start to finish turning the six-mile course in 59 minutes and 27 seconds.

Perfect paddling conditions—

flat water, very little wind, a boost from thousands of cheering spectators—prevailed. Competition in men, women, boys—14-and-under and Run, Swim and Paddle relay events, were held. All contestants used identical 12-foot, 30-pound paddleboards.

The meet's closest finish was turned in by the women, when Outrigger Canoe Club's Kisi Haine nipped Australia's Leigh Temple by a scant six-tenths of a second.

"I became lost offshore and must have paddled an additional 100 yards or more," sighed a dejected Temple. "I didn't know where to turn and no one would tell me."

But Haine, who paddles for OCC's sophomore women's team, was pleased with her first-time performance and wants to try again. "I really wasn't that serious about this race," she said, "but after today, I'm stoked!"

Jay Tansley won the Boys—14-and-under division, while the four-man team consisting of Grady Howe, Boya Fulkerson, Ian Emberson and Marvis Scully, topped the Run, Swim and Paddle competition.
