OCC, Aloha retain volleyball titles

HILO — Outrigger Canoe Club captured the men's division and the Aloha Pineapple team, made up of University of Hawaii Rainbow Wahine players, took the women's crown in the finals of the 24th annual Haili Men's Invitational Volleyball Tournament yesterday.

They each had to turn back teams from Hilo in the finals to retain the titles they captured in 1981.

Outrigger defeated Rap Center of Keaukaha, 15-4, in sudden death after winning in the finals, 15-6, 15-6, to successfully pull its way out of the losers' bracket following a Friday loss to the Outrigger Masters.

Aloha Pineapple, meanwhile, defeated the Hawaiian Magic team made up of Vulcan stars from University of Hawaii-Hilo, 15-11, 15-6, to win its second title behind the awesome net work of Deitre Collins.

Outrigger, paced by setter John Anderson and Ralph Smith, had too much in the title game for the Hiloans.

Rap Center bumped Pizza Bob, 15-7, 15-7, in the semifinals as the Oahu entry took third place.

In women's play, the Vulcans, AKA Magic, scored a stunning 14-8, 7-14, 11-8 upset win over Poi Pounder in the semifinals.

In the novice divisions, The Raggaie Bunch of Oahu sank Kauai Delite, 12-7, 9-15, 15-4 for the men's title and Molokai pumped the Maui Islanders, 12-5, 9-7, for the women's crown.

Molokai had to win a 15-12 sudden death verdict to clinch the title, since the Friendly Islanders also battled out of losers' bracket.

Third place in the men's novice was Keaukaha, which fell to Kauai Delite, 13-7, 15-9, and third in the women's novice was Vaieate of Oahu, which lost a 15-8, 12-10 decision to Molokai in its elimination.

Outrigger, Aloha nail slam titles

Outrigger Canoe Club had to go into sudden death to defeat Keaukaha Rap Center of Hilo in the men's division finals and Aloha Pineapple turned back Hawaiian Magic of Hilo to capture open division crowns Saturday in the 24th annual Haili Men's Invitational Volleyball Tournament at Hilo Civic Auditorium.

Outrigger came out of the losers bracket and downed Keaukaha 15-6, 15-6, to force the sudden death match won by the OCC team, 15-4.

Aloha Pineapple, made up of University of Hawaii Rainbow Wahine stars, defeated Hawaiian Magic, a team of UHH Vulcan stars, 15-11, 15-6, in the finals to wrap up the women's title.

Setter John Anderson and Ralph Smith made the difference in clincher over a tough Keaukaha team, coached by Ray Rowe Sr., and led by Ray Rowe Jr. and Willie Viveiros.

Keaukaha had eliminated Pizza Bob of Oahu, 15-7, 15-7, in the semifinals.

Hawaiian Magic gained the women's finals by surprising Poi Pounders, a Oahu entry led by former Rainbow Diane Sebastian.

In the men's novice division, The Raggaie Bunch of Oahu defeated Kauai Delite, 12-7, 9-15, 15-4, in the finals, while Molokai stopped Maui Islanders, 12-5, 9-7, to nail the women's novice crown.

Keaukaha took third place in the men's novice, losing to Kauai Delite, 15-7, 15-9, and Vaieate of Oahu grabbed third place in the women's novice, falling to Molokai, 15-8, 12-10.

Viveiros and Alofa Tagataese of Hawaiian Magic, captured most valuable

player honors in the men's and women's open divisions, Anderson and Deitre Collins of Aloha Pineapple were named the most outstanding players in the men's and women's open divisions.

Sixty-seven teams took part in the six-day double elimination tournament. All participants were guests Saturday night at the awards luau by the sponsoring Haili Men's Club.
