Hui Nalu claims Kaupiko regatta

Hui Nalu Canoe Club added a fitting finish to the John D. Kaupiko regatta it sponsored yesterday by winning the memorial race before thousands of fans and spectators at crowded Waikiki Beach.

Contending with the moderate surf and a keen determination to claim its own regatta, Hui Nalu captured three first places and six seconds, accumulating 52 points to go home with the Hawaii Canoe Racing Association victory. The club finished second in last year's Kaupiko regatta.

Lanikai was second with 46 points and Outrigger repeated its performance of last year by taking home third place, with 43 points. Defending champion Waikiki Surf was fourth with 33 points.

Hui Nalu held a slight point advantage through most of the afternoon, but clinched the win with the most coveted race — the senior men's two-mile. The club has already brought home a first place for that event three times this season, losing the event only in the season opener.

Yesterday, the crew of Nainoa Thompson, Bruce Blakenfeld, George Kissner, Stretch Spielman, Kala Kukea and Myron Thompson, clocked a 15:46.9 finish, nearly 30 seconds in front of second-place Hui Lanakila.

Yesterday's competition was one of only a few regattas each season in which crews paddle into the waves at Waikiki — a difference that can make or break a race. The sometimes-pounding surf has led racing officials to allow the less expensive fiberglass canoes in place of koa canoes and a more experienced steersman to accompany other crews in the regattas outside protected areas.

While some regard the surf as a headache, other paddlers say they find it challenging.

"I think it's exciting," said Hui Nalu's Myron Thompson, steersman for the senior men, the blue ribbon race winners. "I like it, though I'm not as experienced in the surf as some of the other paddlers. Timing the wave is important, but I couldn't do it without the crew."

Kukea, who coaches and paddles for the crew, said Hui Nalu was about even at the halfway point in the long race, but a wave put the crew past the finish flags first.

The undefeated senior women of Waikiki Surf held onto their perfect state by winning the mile event yesterday, finishing in 9:15.4, ahead of Outrigger and third-place Hui Nalu.

Waikiki Surf's Cindy Kalama, who went back to paddling last year after an 11-year layoff, said she'd rather race in a protected harbor where the surf is not a factor. But her crew

split the water without regard for the waves, winning the mile event by 5.6 seconds.

The crew chose not to use its option of a male steersman, and instead stayed with steersman Shirley Peleka. In addition, Waikiki Surf was one of only two clubs to use koa canoes yesterday. Outrigger also used its koa canoe.

Outrigger coach Nat Norfleet, whose team is usually the biggest threat at a regatta, blamed the third-place finish on bad luck in the lane drawings.

"We've had lane eight 90 percent of the time and there's no waves in lane eight. Our stronger crews are losing and our weaker crews are winning. We lost because of the lanes. We have too many good crews. It won't happen again."

He said in several events his crews were ahead but still lost because another crew would catch a wave. Outrigger tallied four second places and three firsts.

"This is a lucky race," said Kailua coach Kalani Young, whose sophomore men placed first in their mile event. "If you catch a wave you can win. All season long you can win an event and then lose this one because of a wave."

Craighton Hadley, who coached the first-place Koolau junior men's crew, said the waves "make it anyone's race."

His crew maintained a lead for most of the first mile in the race, but nearly lost the advantage when a wave sent Hui Nalu in front at the turn. But Koolau regained the lead in the final half-mile.

"It would have broken my heart to work that hard for nothing," said Hadley.

And while the surf is an added challenge, the rule allowing an experienced steersman to help in crews outside his division may win the race in some cases.

"I think it makes a big difference," said Gary "Sword" Murakami. His junior women won their half-mile race in 4:02.8 with Murakami as steersman. "Experience helps and it gives the crew a lot of confidence."

Ellen Pabilano, coach and paddler for that crew agreed. "Having your head coach as your steersman makes a race beautiful," she said.

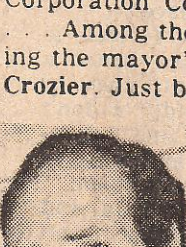

Here visitors can get a view of how the ancient Hawaiians traveled from island to island in their sturdy koa craft stabilized by an outrigger.

The event is named for the late Walter "Mac" MacFarlane, president of the Outrigger Canoe Club which in earlier years occupied the beach area adjacent to the Moana Hotel.

The qualifying clubs of the Oahu Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association will be participating in age groups ranging from 12-year-old crews up to senior men and women.

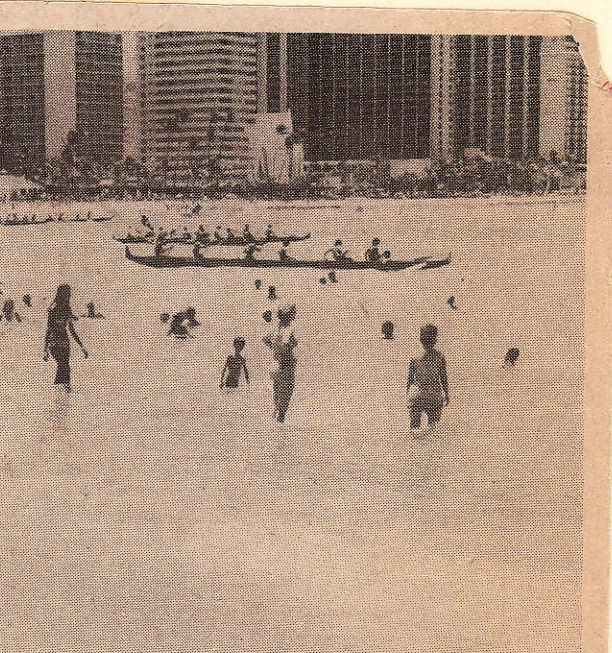
The MacFarlane Regatta course, divided

into seven or eight lanes, starts at the beach fronting the Moana Hotel and extends seaward through the surf for one quarter mile, then returns to finish at the beach.

To keep the event as authentically "old" Hawaiian as possible, only koa canoes will be used in the regatta.

The featured race will be for the senior men over a two-mile course. To the winning senior men's team goes the Matson Navigation Company's perpetual trophy containing the names of winning teams since 1943.

The entire program will last approximately six hours depending on surf conditions. Sometimes the ocean is
