volley tourney set

The 1970 National Volleyball Championships won't begin until Wednesday but it's already a record making event.

A record 110 teams filed applications for the four-day titular playdown and a record 101 teams were accepted.

When preliminary matches finally get under way on courts at both University of Hawaii's Otto Klum gym and the McKinley High School gym, some 1200 players will participate. Another 600 officials and coaches are also in town for the big event.

ACTION WILL begin at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday through Saturday.

Both the semifinal and final matches in four divisions will be held at the Honolulu International Center Arena at 1 p.m. and 6:30 p.m. Saturday.

Although it's a national tournament, two foreign teams from Mexico and Canada traditionally play in this annual classic.

ALSO HERE for the tournament is the Japan women's team, a perennial world

power. The Japan team will meet the new national open women's team in a special exhibition match.

The four titles up for grabs are the open men, open women, senior men and the YMCA.

Chart House of Los Angeles, recent winner of the AAU championships, has been seeded No. 1 in the open men. This is basically the Los Angeles YMCA team which went all the way last year.

THE DEFENDING champion Shamrocks of Long Beach, Calif., are top-ranked in the open women with Honolulu YMCA seeded No. 2.

Kenneth Allen of Chicago

is top-rated in the senior men with Outrigger Canoe Club second.

Over 200 matches will be played before the champions are crowned on Saturday night.

Among the officials here are members of the U.S. Olympic committee, who will make preview selections for the U.S. men's and women's teams to compete in the World Games in Bulgaria later this year. They will

also note prospective players for the 1972 Olympic Games.

HAWAII IS well represented at the Olympic level in Tom Haine and Pete Velasco.

Haine, the 1968 Olympic Games captain, will play for both the Outrigger open and senior teams.

Pete Velasco, the 1964 captain, will compete for Church College of Hawaii's open team.
