## motocross, Pokai Bay regatta good bets for action

If you haven't been out to a motocross yet, tomorrow is as good a time as any to watch one.

The Hawaii Central Sports motorcycle committee and the Sandwich Isle Riders are sponsoring such an event at 10 a.m. tomorrow at the Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station Wheels of Oahu track.

The race should appeal to fans who like action.

THE RIDERS, and more than 100 is expected, hit speeds close to 50 mph while lapping a dusty and difficult course with assorted hardships — narrow trails, drops, steep inclines and declines, hair-pin turns and holes of various types.

Each contestant must prove his merits three times, competing in three 15 to 20 minutes heats. The rider logging most laps finishes first and is awarded most points. Winners are contestants with most points.

SINCE EIGHT divisions makes up the day. Trophies are awarded to the winners at the end of the race. determined by bike size and the riders' experience divide the field, a total of 24 races

Admission is \$1.

THE CANOE season's second regatta also starts 10 a.m. tomorrow at Pokai Bay.

The regatta will be a rematch between long time rivals Waikiki Surf Club and Outrigger Canoe Club — the two top teams in the state.

Last week, at the Kamehameha Day regatta off Kailua Beach Park, WSC, the 1969 Kam Day champion, took second to Outrigger, runners-up to Waikiki in 1969.

WAIKIKI usually has the

stronger teams in the blue ribbon senior men's and senior women's races, but Outrigger shows better all-around strength for the other 12 events.

Chris Faria, race committee chairman of the Canoe Racing Association, said 10 Oahu clubs will compete tomorrow.

Order of Kamehameha will be making its first appearance this year.

Faria also said tomorrow's events should be more challenging as some races will be over waves.

This could mean disaster for some clubs, since even with the smooth seas at Kai-

lua, canoes swamped last week.

THE HAWAIIAN Powerboat Association's monthly race originally scheduled for tomorrow has been postponed one week to June 28, at Keehi Lagoon.

The Hawaii Rally and Sports Car Club, in a drive for a cleaner Hawaii and club jackets for its members, is holding a car wash today at Wahiawa Texaco. The cost is one dollar from 9 a.m. till 4 p.m.

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### E. Magoon, 78, killed in California

Honolulu businessman and attorney Eaton H. Magoon Sr., 78, died Wednesday in a one-car accident at Napa, Calif.

Funeral arrangements are pending.

Mr. Magoon is the father of Eaton H. "Bob" Magoon Jr., Honolulu playwright, composer and businessman, and Orville T. Magoon, of Menlo Park, Calif.

HIS WIFE, Genevieve is in satisfactory condition in a Napa hospital.

Mr. Magoon, of 3641 Diamond Head Road, was born Aug. 28, 1891, in Honolulu, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Alfred Magoon.

He attended Punahou School, Manzanita Hall in Palo Alto, Calif., and the University of Hawaii. In 1920 he received his law degree from Hastings College of the Law, University of California.

HE WAS ADMITTED to the Bar of the Territory of Hawaii in 1921. He served as an assistant U.S. attorney from 1923 to 1925.

Since 1930 he was treasurer-manager and attorney of Magoon Brothers, Ltd., and Magoon Estate, Ltd.

Mr. Magoon was past chairman of the Real Estate License Commission of the Territory of Hawaii and was a member of Oahu Country Club, the Outrigger Canoe Club, the Bar Association of Hawaii and the American Bar Association.

He was an avid outdoor sportsman and enjoyed deep sea fishing and duck hunting.

Besides his widow and two sons, Mr. Magoon is survived by five grandchildren; brothers, J. H. Magoon Sr. and Alfred K. Magoon, and sisters, Mrs. Catherine Hus-tace and Mrs. Emmeline Garnett.

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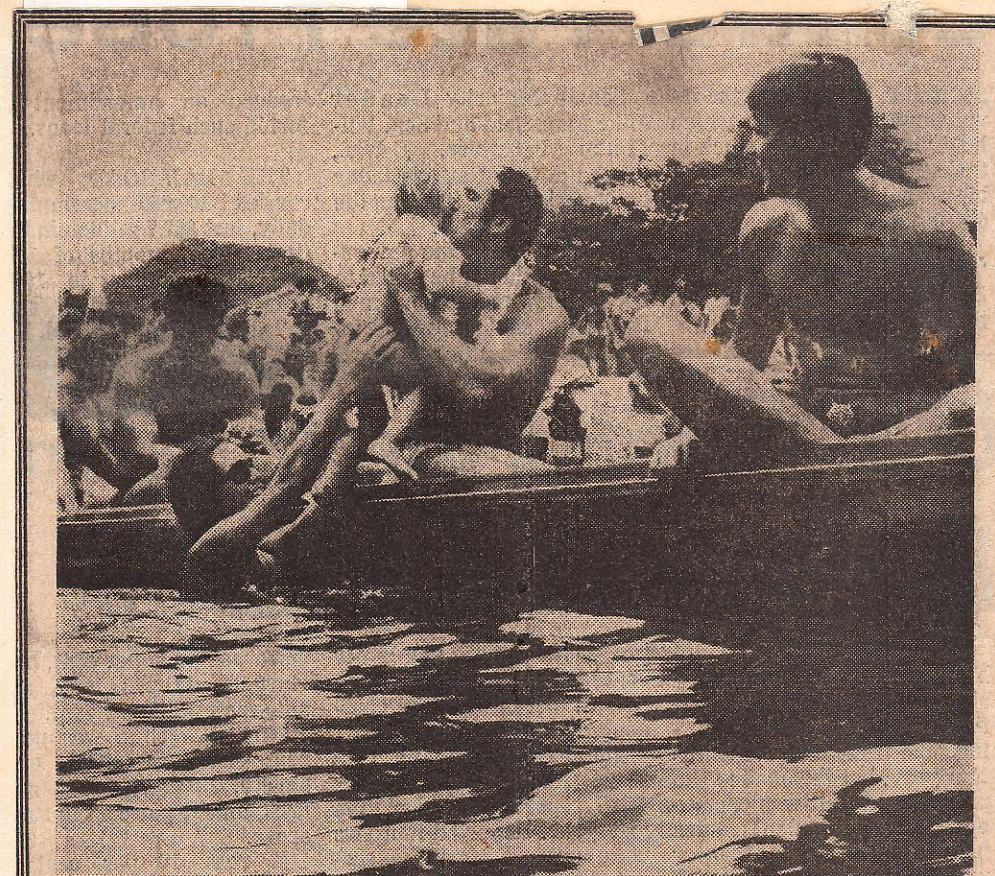
### canoe regatta slated today
