Waikiki's Famous Surfs Are All Aptly Dubbed

Surfers regard the water as their second home, thus it isn't surprising that they've given names to the many surf spots along Waikiki Beach.

From dawn to dusk you'll find Waikiki's waters filled with an assortment of people and boards. Waikiki is quite literally the world's surfing capital.

The names of the surf spots are colorful yet practical, usually describing not only the waves but their locations as well. For example, Castle, located straight out in front of the Outrigger Canoe Club, is supposedly named for the family that formerly owned land on this spot.

Public's (or Public Baths, named for the public bath facilities that once stood at this spot) is located straight out from the Natatorium.

Queen's, in front of popular Kuhio Beach, has fast, crowded waves.

Canoe's, directly in front of the Moana Hotel, provides a various assortment of swift, close to perfect waves and is named for all the outrigger canoeing done at this spot.

Malihini, in front of

the Royal Hawaiian Hotel, is a good beginner's spot close to the beach with gentle waves. It is also known as Cornucopia.

Popular's stands between the Halekulani and the Surfrider on what used to be known as Gray's Beach.

Resident experts on the sport at the Surfrider and adjacent hotels along Waikiki Beach are the beachboys, the men who teach the art of riding the waves to countless thousands of visitors to Waikiki each year.

If you haven't done so yet, take a walk along the beach where you'll find surfers, at any hour of the day, practicing this sport at a dozen different places. You might even venture into the malahini surf to try your hand at riding the waves.

Webster Retires After 37 Years With Brewer

John J.G. Webster retires February 1 after 37 years with C. Brewer and Company, Limited and two years with the plantation subsidiary where he was brought up.

Born in Hilo, Webster joined Pepeekeo Sugar Company in 1928, the year he was graduated from the University of California at Berkeley with a BS in agricultural economics. His father, James managed Pepeekeo from 1904 to 1930 and Jack was raised in the plantation community.

Except for two years with Pepeekeo from 1928 to 1930, and two years with Hilo Electric Company from 1930 to 1932, Webster has worked for C. Brewer in the Honolulu main office.

He joined the C. Brewer's plantation department in 1932, was appointed assistant secretary in 1945, assistant treasurer in 1946 and was corporate secretary from 1948 through 1962 when he stepped down because of ill health. Since then he has been an assistant secretary and assistant treasurer.

Webster is a member of the Outrigger Canoe Club, the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce and the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Assn. He and his wife, Cecilia, have two daughters.
