Word out of South Africa indicates that the professional surfing curcuit continues to expand on international lev-

The latest pro contest will be known as the Durban 500 and will offer \$3,000 in prize money, half of which will go to the winner.

The South African Surfing Association, sponsor of the Durban 500, has invited Hawaii surfers to compete July

The South Africans contend their surf is better than that experienced during the Australian world contest and very suitable for Hawaiians who usually perfer large,

hard-breaking waves.

Surfers who have already announced their intentions to travel to Durban are Aussies Midget Farrelly and Nat Young and California world champion Rolf Aurness.

Locally, Keone Downing is toying with the idea.

South Africa would like to win the bid to host the 1974 World Surfing Championships, and no doubt it sees this pro contest as a handy vehicle to project Durban's surf around the globe.

Fanning the flame shouldn't prove difficult. But . . . this columnist wonders if a contest as presti-gious as the WSC should ever agree to focusing world attention on a country that so proudly upholds a doctrine of racial intolerance.

The '72 WSC is slated for Hawaii. All that is needed to make it all jell is money. We have the surf, the guiding know-how and the will and desire.

"The '72 contest will be staged as a first-rate affair—or not at all. It will be the first to make a profit," Downing

Surprisingly, the WSC is not a professional event. Eduardo Arena, president and founder of the sanctioning International Surfing Federation, explained this oddity:

"The contest itself offers nothing more than a silver trophy which I had remade three times before it met my satisfaction.

But I'm sure no contest brings the victor more mone-

tary reward than the world title.

"All three prior champions, Felipe Pomar, Nat Young and Fred Hemmings have benefited immensely from their two-year crowns.

Arena was referring to the numerous endorsements and business positions which were opened to the world champions. Obviously the world title carries commercial weight-more than the Duke or United States Surfboard

But despite Arena's position, we believe the contest would grow in stature if it went professional. Profession-Championships. als carry with them a glow of excitement, they evoke a mass worship and following that only the Olympic Games can rival on the amateur level.

Johnny Weissmuller, one of the greatest swimmers in history, has been named International Commissioner of marathon swimming by the Professional Marathon

Swimming Federation. In accepting the new post, Weissmuller—who won five Olympic gold medals and set 52 world records for a variety of freestyle and backstroke distances between 1921 and 1927—said he is pleased at the opportunity of helping regulate the sport, in which races are conducted over

courses ranging from 10 to 60 miles. "Although my longest distance swim was three-miles, I feel this is a sport in which the participants are among the best-trained athletes in the world," he said.
