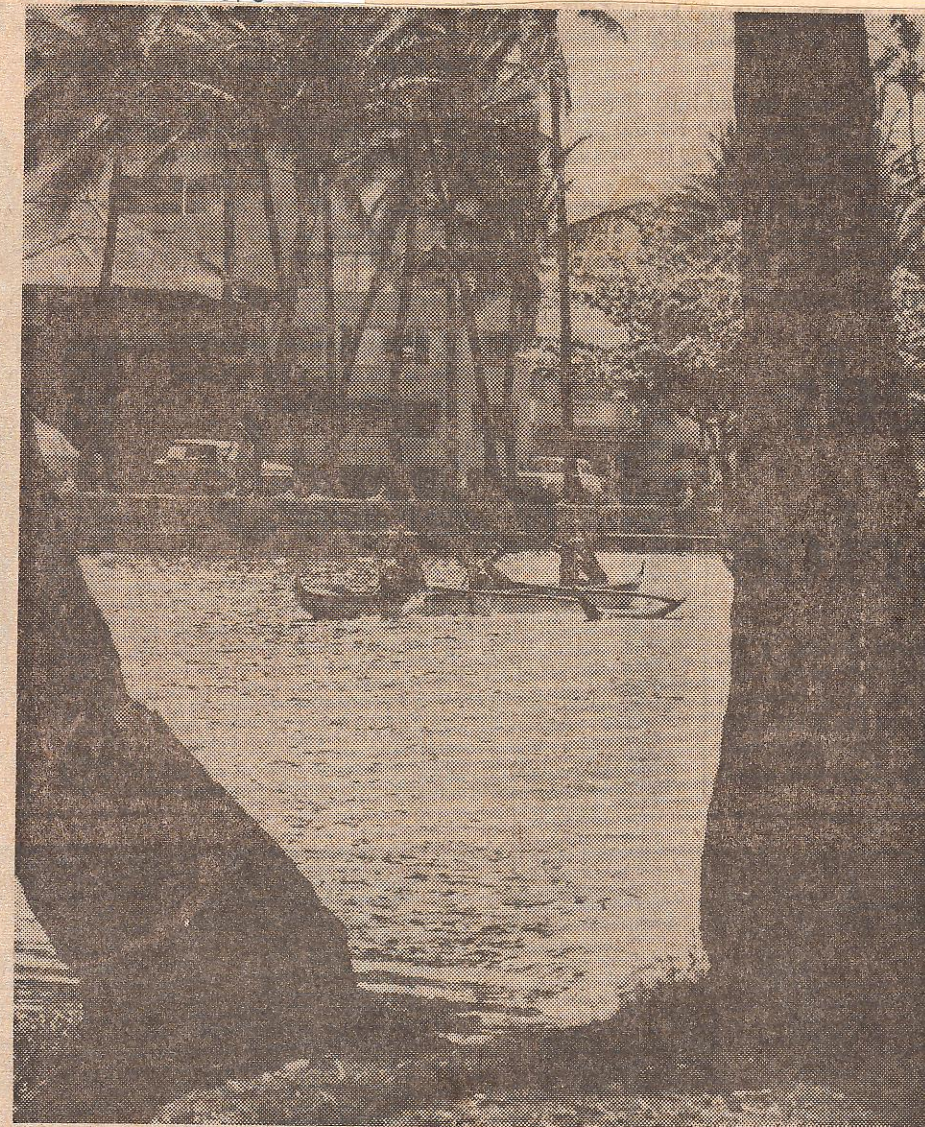
Urging those concerned to build bigger and better restaurant and entertainment facilities, Milano said the leisure revolution started in the 1960s and will explode in the 1970s.

Macfarlane canoe regatta due Saturday off Waikiki

One of the biggest and most exciting canoe races of the year — the annual Walter J. Macfarlane Memorial Regatta — is on tap for the July 4th holiday at Waikiki Beach.

The races, which are sponsored and conducted by the Outrigger Canoe Club under the auspices of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association,

will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday and continue for three to five hours, depending on surf conditions.

The Macfarlane Regatta course starts at the beach fronting the Moana Hotel. It extends seaward through the surf for one-half mile, then returns to the finish at the beach.

The Outrigger Canoe Club is defending team champion of the regatta. Defending champion of the feature race

— the grueling 2½-mile senior men's — is the Waikiki Surf Club.

COMPETITION will be held in all age divisions. Perpetual trophies go to the winners of the senior men's, boys 14-and-under, and men's open four-man races.

The annual regatta honors the memory of Walter J. Macfarlane, former president of the Outrigger Canoe Club who died in 1943 at the age of 36.
