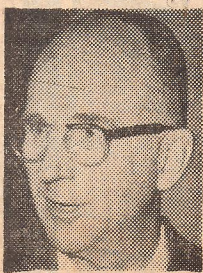

## Ulrich John Rainalter Dead at 74

Ulrich John Rainalter, 74, former president of Hawaiian Trust Co., died Thursday at Queen's Hospital after a short illness.

He lived at 25 Wood St.

Graveside services over the ashes will be held at 4:30 p.m. Monday at the family plot in Oahu Cemetery, with the family and close friends attending. In lieu of flowers, the family requests that contributions be made in Mr. Rainalter's memory to the Hawaii Heart Association.

Mr. Rainalter retired in 1956 as president and manager of Hawaiian Trust after 36 years with the company. He remained as a director.

He was born in St. Joseph, Mo. He was graduated from high school there, later studying at the University of Missouri.

He was graduated from the Army Service School at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., and was commissioned in 1918. He served with the 25th Infantry until 1920.

Mr. Rainalter joined Hawaiian Trust that same year, working in its stock and bond department, and in 1923 was named treasurer and director. He became secretary of the firm in 1927, vice president and secretary in 1930, and assistant manager and vice president in 1946.

He served on the board and executive committee of the Bank of Hawaii and was a director of American Factors, East Kauai Water Co., Hawaiian Electric Co., Hilo Tribune-Herald, Home Insurance Co. of Hawaii, Honolulu Construction & Drying, Honolulu Paper Co., Honolulu Star-Bulletin, Kauai Stores, Kekaha Sugar Co., Lihue Plantation Co., Hawaiian Telephone Co., Waiahi Electric Co., Walker-Moody Construction Co. and Joseph Schwartz, Ltd.

He was a member of the Oahu Country Club, Outrigger Canoe Club, Phi Delta Theta Fraternity, American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, Hawaiian Sugar Planters Association and Keys and Whistles.

Mr. Rainalter is survived by a son, Ulrich John Jr., a daughter, Mrs. James J. (Dorothy) Wood of McLean, Va.; sister, Mrs. John W. (Miden) Broadus of St. Joseph, Mo.; three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

His wife, Dorothy, died in 1967. Another son, William John, a Marine fighter pilot, was killed in the Korean War.

## 'Man with the cat', John Sheppard, dies

One member of two long-time Waikiki personalities, John Sheppard and his constant feline companion "Buddy", has died.

Mr. Sheppard, 74, Hawaii's "man with the cat," died Sunday at Kaiser Hospital after a brief illness.

BUDDY, the Siamese cat who shared the last 10 years of his life, will be looked after by a friend, Andrea Chalmers, of 2427-B Ala Wai Blvd.

"We're planning to keep Buddy unless one of Mr. Sheppard's other friends wants him," Mrs. Chalmers said.

She and her family have three other cats so he won't be without company, she said.

JOHN SHEPPARD was a native of Brooklyn but had always dreamed of coming to Hawaii.

When he retired from his New York job as a trust officer for Dean Witter Co. he sailed for the Islands where he would spend the last 13 years of his life.

He arrived in 1955 and immediately became a regular part of Waikiki, where he loved to stroll with Buddy draped around his shoulders.

Mr. Sheppard often commented that Buddy had been stroked by perhaps more people from all over the world than any other Siamese cat.

ACTIVE UNTIL the last hours of his life, he served as an accountant for Radio Station KNDD in Waikiki. Buddy was always at his side and the friendship they shared was evident to everyone.

A 2:30 p.m. memorial service will be held tomorrow for Mr. Sheppard on the beach at the Outrigger Club in Waikiki. Following the service, his ashes will be scattered at sea.

Mr. Sheppard has no known survivors.
