MR. HENSHAW was born Nov. 24, 1889, in Downey, Calif. He was graduated from Stanford University in

old Matson liner Wilhelmina in 1913, he worked briefly in the insurance department of H. Hackfeld and Co. He then returned to California to earn his law degree, was admitted to the California bar in 1916, and came back to Honolulu to work with the law firm of Holmes and Ol-

With the entry of the United States into World War I, Mr. Henshaw entered the Army, rising to captain in the infantry.

In 1919, he joined briefly the law firm of Robertson and Olson. Later that year he began a 17-year association with Bishop Trust Co.,

serving as a trust officer, treasurer, director and a vice president.

After several years as president of Hawaiian Properties, Ltd., Mr. Henshaw again turned to the practice of law in 1937, joined by a former Stanford classmate, William R. Ouderkirk.

IN ADDITION, he became president of the old Home Savings and Loan Associa-

In 1953, Mr. Henshaw formed the law firm of Henshaw, Conroy and Hamilton, and was senior partner until his death.

From 1929 to 1931 he was chairman of the Board of Prison Supervisors. He also served for 10 years, until 1959, on the Territorial Harbor Board. Mr. Henshaw was associated, too, with the Blood Bank of Hawaii. He was a member of the National Loyalty Review Board and an officer and trustee of Kauikeolani Children's Hospital, and a former director of the Medical Center.

He was a member of the Hawaii Bar Association, Oahu Country Club, Outrigger Canoe Club and a charter member of Mid-Pacific Country Club.
