The Californians have sailed the Hobie Cats since Alter first started launching them from his boat factory in San Juan Capistrano two and a half years ago. The Hawaii sailors are as accustomed to stiff winds as they are to tying their shoe laces.

ALTER FINISHED second overall, as he did in last year's championship held at San Diego, Calif. His finals points stood at 171/4, versus 17 for Sheeley. Wayne Schafer of California took third overall at 3634, and Ted Crane of Hawaii took fourth.

"I just kinda followed Hobie around the course,' Sheeley said yesterday at the trophy presentations.
