Sailing's Super Bowl

Hoist anchor, mates. Set sail for Windward Oahu and yachting's Super Bowl. The sixth annual State sailing championship begins Saturday on Kaneohe Bay.

Each fall Hawaii's best skippers sail off in alike boats for the most important regatta of the season. Vying for top prize are 23 yachtsmen from seven Oahu clubs who were selected as a result of winning individual club eliminations or fleet titles. Four races are scheduled; two heats will sail each Saturday and Sunday in identical Cal-20 sloops.

On the minds of most yachtsmen is the unanswered question: "Can Honolulu skippers beat those from Kaneohe?" In the past five years the title has shuffled between KYC's Cy Gillette (three-time winner) and Charles Dole (two-time titlist) and both are on hand once


To further Honolulu's gloom are the two KYC Thistle sailors Glenn Clark Jr. and Tom Carpenter, consistent winners in small boat competition. So once again there is little hope for sunshine in the City.

However, Honolulu is sending its best. There's Waikiki YC's Bob Miller who wins most of the Cal 2-30 offshore events; Hawaii YC's Ells Harris and WYC's Peter Dillingham who have both placed fourth in previous championships, the best Honolulu effort, plus many fine sailors from the Pacific, Pearl Harbor, La Mariana, and Outrigger clubs.
