Peru Championships

The international surfing scene moves to south of the border next month. Club Waikiki of Lima, sponsor of the annual Peruvian International Surfing Championships, expects a goodly number of surfers from California and Hawaii to partake in the festive activities Feb. 26 through March 9.

The contests (big and small wave) will be run off whenever the surf warrants during that period. In between it will be fun and games.

Peruvian Airlines has organized a tour, departing California, which is expected to entice numerous surfers.

Surfers from Hawaii who will take part include Jeff Hakman and Brant Ackerman, but others are sure to jet south.

Hakman earned the free trip after his victory in December's Duke Classic (courtesy Club Waikiki); Ackerman was selected to represent Outrigger Canoe Club by its board of directors and at the invitation of Club Waikiki.

Australian Peter Drouyn will join the pair on a free ride earned when he won the Makaha International. Countryman Nat Young has the opportunity to represent Australia and the Smirnoff World Pro-Am, but is undecided whether to accept.

Fiesta Time, Too

Probably more so than any other surf contest in the world, the Peru affair is a blend of ability in the water and social mixing. And this year it promises to be even better because of the added flavor of fiesta which will include everything from fireworks to street dancing.

The City of Miraflores is a co-sponsor and plans parties galore to entertain the foreigners.

Past champions of the contest have been Hawaiian's Joey Cabell and Fred Hemming, Mike Doyle, California, and Peru's own Felipe Pomar.

Invited judges this year will be Neal Iversen, Hawaii, and Rudy Huber, East Coast.

Surf can be expected to reach 15 feet at Punta Rocas, a rocky cliff barricade which fronts the Pacific at Peru's most famous big-wave site.

The small-wave version of the contest is usually staged near the Club Waikiki in a true country club setting on a par with polo.

To win in Peru is swell—to have fun—that's the name of the game.

Ratings Released

The Hawaii Surfing Association released its 1970 ratings this week for amateurs and professional surfers. The professional division held some surprises for anyone who judges professionalism by accepted guidelines.

For instance, of the top-rated 11 surfers, only four earned a dime in surfing purses. The other seven have no tax problems.

If money earned established a professional, then the following should be recognized: Jeff Hakman and Felipe Pomar (\$1,000), Jim Blears (\$700), Gerry Lopez (\$300), Ryan Dotson (\$250), Paul Strauch (\$150), Reno Abellira and Mike Lalley (\$100) and Barry Kanaiaupuni (\$25).

That's \$3,625 won by Hawaiian surfers in two pro contests—Smirnoff World Pro-Am and Duke Classic. Total purse offered was \$6,750, not a bad percentage to share with Australia and California which also had men in the money.

(We list Peruvian Pomar under Hawaii's masthead through his extended residency and his own admission of intent to remain in the Islands.)

Will the figures printed above look ridiculously insignificant in 12, 18, 24 months?

Chances are that they will if Ron Sorrell ties a contract together with a Mainland sponsor new to the sport.
