ORLD-CLASS beachboy Chick Daniels, who died Sept. 9 at the age of 83, was given a final sendoff Tuesday, a farewell worthy of beachboy royalty. Chick ran the beach service in front of the




Royal Hawaiian for many years and that's where his last rites, conducted by the Rev. Abraham Akaka, were held. Tapes of Chick singing were played prior to Akaka's emotional service. Be-

fore the fleet of outrigger canoes accompanied his ashes out to sea, Jake Hoke led Zoulou, Blue Makua, Gabby Makalena, Jimmy Hakuole, Kalakaua Aylett, Rabbit Kekai, Sonny Kekuewa and others in singing the Hui Nalu song. Sheraton was well represented by hotel managers. Among the many other beachboys on hand was Steamboat Mokuahi Jr., who said Chick "left a lotta things to a lotta people. He was always giving us kids good advice"

THREE OF CHICK'S children, Bobby and Joe Daniels and Mary Lee Makalena, took their father's ashes out to sea in a canoe steered by Harry Robello. Another daughter, Winona Amasiu, was in another boat. Steering other canoes were Turkey Love, Steamboat Mokuahi Sr. and Kekai.

Former film actress Dorothy Mackaill, who had known Daniels for many years, went out in a canoe. Early beachboys Ox Keaulani and Joe Akana, as well as Charley Lambert and John "Menehune" Ohelo of a later era, were there, too. Two canoes from the Outrigger Canoe club, steered by Freddie Noa and Ron Sorrell, were



six boats from various canoe clubs. Noa picked up many leis donated by the lei sellers in Chinatown and at the airport for the services. After Chick's ashes were scattered, one canoe swamped twice coming into shore. Zoulou was in it and brightened a gray day by saying, "All right, which one of you guys owes Chick money?" 

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## Aussie Paddler Overpowers Kayak Field

How much longer can Hawaii's generous Aloha spirit bear the burden? Some Island kayak paddlers say it's been too long already. Each winter season, Australians enter Ha-waii's pro surfing meets and more often than not they waltz away with the top cash prizes. Californian and Tahitian paddlers have been winning major trophies for years competing in the prestigious Molokai-to-Oahu outrigger canoe race. So where does that leave our island kayak strokers?

If yesterday's sixth edition of the annual Kanaka Ikaika Molokai-to-Hawaii Kai Kayak Race was an example, the local paddlers are floundering in the ocean without a paddle.

Race winner and defending champion Grant Kenny of Australia was awesome yesterday while surging to his fourth consecutive Molokai-Oahu race victory—his fourth straight course record

All the 19-year-old Queensland paddler managed to accomplish was to turn the 30-mile course in three hours, 39 minutes and 31 seconds—a whopping 19 minutes faster than his record time of last year and a comfortable 32 minutes ahead of Outrigger Canoe Club's Marshall Rosa, his nearest competitor

ALTHOUGH THE LOCAL kayak paddlers enjoy top competition, they also would enjoy the thrill of winning. "Enough is enough already," one of Kenny's competitors said with

the proverbial tongue in cheek.
Several of the 13 starters attempted to stay with the fast-stroking Aussie but they quickly burned out. "This guy is strong. No way could I match his pace," remarked the game 37-year-old Rosa, an Oahu carpenter. The race began at Molokai's Laau Point and finished at Hawaii Kai's Maunalua Beach Park.

Kenny, who placed seventh in the recent World Kayak Championship at Yugoslavia,

World Kayak Championship at Yugoslavia, simply overpowered his competition.

"I paddled harder and rode more waves than in previous years," remarked Kenny.
"This made bettering my time (over last year) easier." Kenny is Australia's brightest kayak hope for the '84 Olympic Games.

Third-place finisher Bob Twogood of Kaneohe, Hawaii's Olympic kayak prospect for 1984, said that he may have been in sprint-condition but certainly not in shape for pad-

condition but certainly not in shape for paddling across a channel. "I just didn't have it (the endurance)," he explained. Twogood, 30, won several medals in national sprint competition on the Main-

land this past summer.

KENNY STARTED OFF with a quick pace and was never seriously pressured. "I covered Bob (Twogood) for a few miles and then dropped south to look for Marshall (Rosa)," the winner casually explained. When Kenny could see that his lead was seen the Austin produled. see that his lead was safe, the Aussie paddled

a direct course for Oahu. Meanwhile, Twogood, who finished second to Kenny in the past two races, was disappointed with his third place. "I didn't expect to stay with Grant (Kenny), but I sure expected to beat Marshall (Rosa)," he added.

Except for Mike Mueller's one-man outrigger cance—the only outrigger in the room.

ger canoe-the only outrigger in the racemost of the boats were Australian designed surf skis (a type of kayak 19-feet in length and weighing between 35 and 40 pounds). Mueller finished 12th overall in six hours and two minutes padding his beauting capacity. two minutes paddling his heavier canoe.

Although wind and sea conditions were perfect for racing, the small turnout disappointed the entrants. "Any time that a race has fewer (seven less) entries than the year before something is wrong," said Outrigger Canoe Club's Mark Buck, who placed seventh in the

13-boat field. Buck sees kayak racing as the wave of the future but he believes that the race was held too early in the year. "It should be scheduled after Oahu's outrigger canoe racing season (after mid-October)," Buck added. He believes kayaks will draw outrigger canoe paddlers during the off-season.
