Kauai Wins State Volleyball Title

The Kauai Volleyball Association fielded a team that came back from Honolulu this week after winning the State class "B" tournament.

Now the latest word from Head Coach Jerry Kaluna is that the same team will go back to Honolulu on April 14, 15 to go for the Class "A" title.

When the "B" tournament began, the Kauai #2 team was seeded 10th in a field of 11 teams but kept winning in the winners' bracket and came home the champs.

The eleven teams were: Waimanalo, U.H., Nuuanu YMCA, Navy, Paki Park, Church College, Outrigger Canoe Club, Maui, Nick's Fishmarket, Kauai #2, and Kauai #1. The Kauai #2 team was disbanded because not enough of the players could get off and go to Honolulu to play in the tournament.

The Kauai champs first beat the Church College team and then took on ex-champ Waimanalo which they also downed to stay in the winner bracket. Then came the big test as the Kauai team took on highly touted University of Hawaii . . . they also beat them.

The U.H. stayed alive in the consolation bracket and came back to challenge the Kauai team again . . . the U.H. took the first game but the Kauai champs came back and won the "B" tournament by downing the U.H. for the second time.

The next big tournament is this weekend in Hilo when the Haili tournament gets underway with 38 teams competing including teams from California. The Kauai team will have to pass this one up due to lack of funds, but if everything goes according to plans, the team will get the needed funds to make the trip to Honolulu on April 14, 15 to go for the State "A" title.

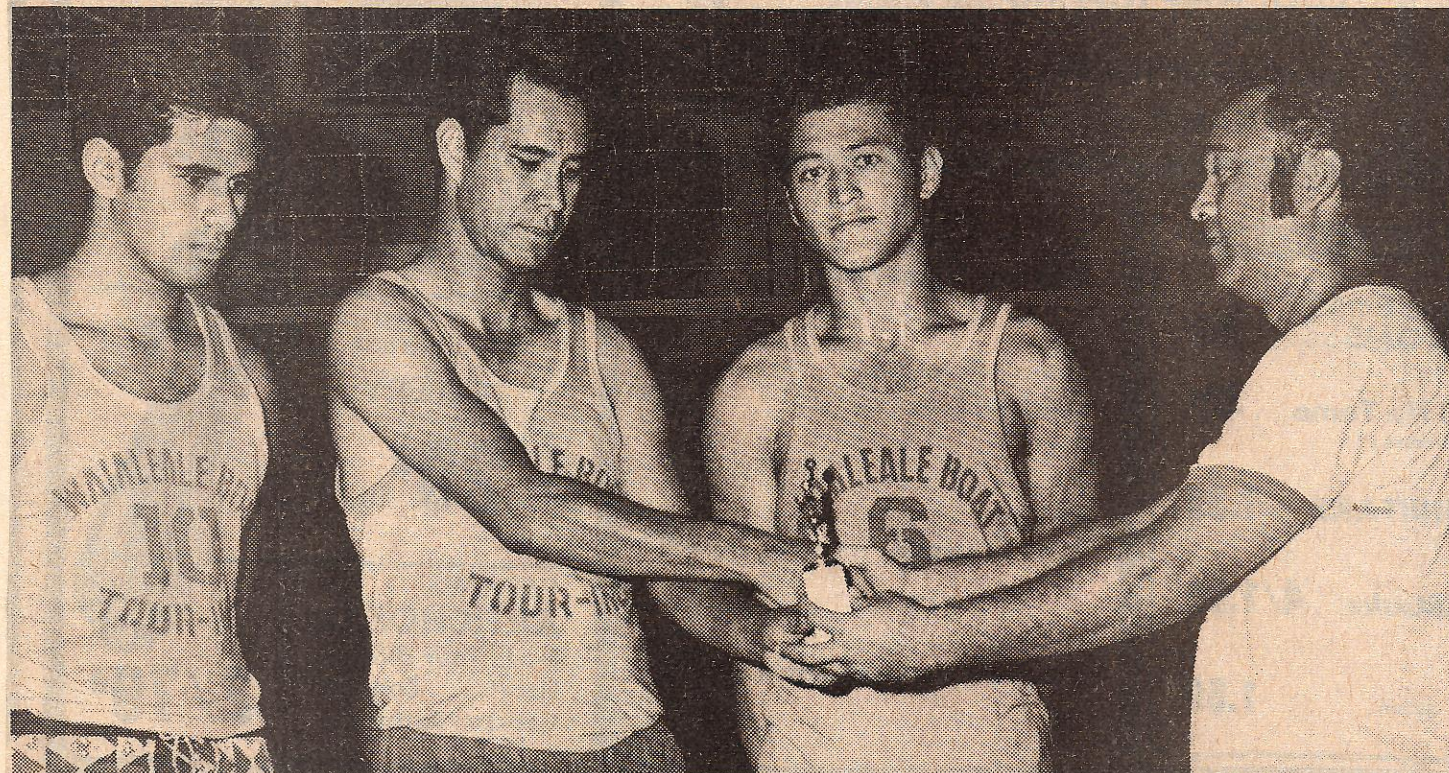
Jerry Kaluna, who is also acting president of the Kauai Volleyball Association, has word that the Kauai team is seeded second in the tournament.

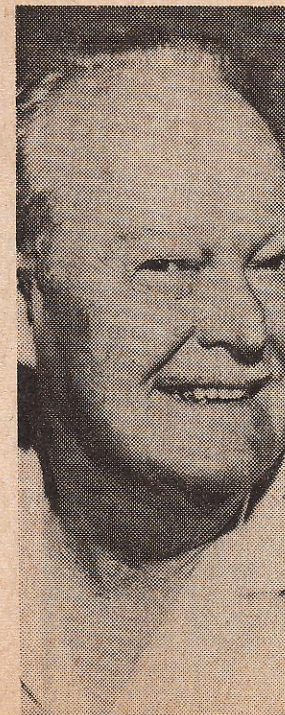

Founder of 'Brownny' Perfume Firm Dies

Charles H. "Brownny" Brown, 69, a pioneer manufacturer of Hawaiian perfumes, died yesterday in Queen's Medical Center.

Mr. Brown started his perfume business in 1947 when he and his wife Jeanette, better known as "Straussie," stopped over in Honolulu en route to China, where they planned to establish a cosmetics company.

Bored with waiting for passports, Mr. Brown cooked up a batch of solid perfume in his Makiki apartment and sold it to eager merchants.

Encouraged by this and having fallen in love with the Islands, he decided to remain in Hawaii. He founded Brownny of Honolulu, manufacturer of perfume and allied products.

Inserting Island flowers in the perfume bottles helped to make the company a success.

In 1964 Mr. Brown sold

majority interest in the company to John Mills.

A native of Chicago, Mr. Brown was a longtime member of the Outrigger Canoe Club, Waikiki Rotary Club, Pacific and Elks clubs and the Navy League.

Services over the ashes will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday at Atherton Memorial Chapel, Central Union Church.

In lieu of flowers, contributions may be made to the Rehabilitation Center of Hawaii or the Hawaii Heart Fund.

In addition to his widow, Mr. Brown is survived by a sister, Mrs. John Smith of Wheeler, Ind.
