Surf Spray

The results of the summer's first canoe regatta held last Sunday off Kailua Beach pretty much points to another summer of canoe racing domination by the Big Three canoe clubs.

Outrigger, Healani and Waikiki Surf appear to have reached into that inexhaustible bag of paddlers they possess and come up with well-rounded crews.

And Kailua Hawaiian Civic Club, Lanikai and Hui Nalu don't look too far off the early pace.

Outrigger, by virtue of a tie with Healani for the Kamehameha Day laurels, stretched an unbeaten string to six regattas — five of them last year.

Outrigger looked particularly strong in the youth races, scoring 24 of their 33 points with crews 14 years old and younger.

And sweeping the first three races was reminiscent of 1970 when the club grabbed the first four of the day.

BUT STRENGTH can change annually, as was unconsciously brought to our attention prior to the junior men's race.

"Outrigger was an easy winner last year."

Sunday the Outrigger junior crew finished a well-beaten last in a race that Healani won with ridiculous ease.

The Healani junior six — Terry Deacon, Allen Price, Larry Hanohano, Clem Paiaina Jr., Cappy Sheeley and Richard Lovell — were easily the class of the regatta.

Outrigger paddler Pat Spencer later commented that Healani's junior crew had several times topped

its club's senior six in practice.

Hui Nalu's senior men won a close contest from Waikiki Surf and Healani, with Outrigger not too far off the pace.

IF WAIKIKI SURF acts as expected, it should turn the tables Sunday at Pokai Bay by defeating Hui Nalu and winning the blue-ribbon race of the day.

If there is one thing Surf Club doesn't take kindly to it is losing this class. So look for them to once again gain the State crown.

However, the club championship should once again end up with Outrigger because of its depth and ability to add points in almost every race.

Also, as the year progresses Outrigger will be represented by a senior women's crew, and one or two points here (automatically lost in the Healani tie) can spell the difference.

It was the wahine paddlers who brought them the State title at Nawiliwili in '70. But that trend did not develop at Kailua Sunday.
