He's the 'Dean' of Paddling

"This race was a gruel-really not a lot of fun," said 19-year-old bikiniclad Kisi Haine after spending a wearying two hours and 21 minutes battling a strong southerly wind and choppy seas in yesterday's 10,000-meter (6.2-mile) Diamond Head Surfboard Paddling Championships off

"My neck is sore, my arms are tired, and I don't care if I see another paddleboard for a while," she added. "The fun of this race was when it was over.'

Waikiki.

While Haine, a Stanford University sophomore, found yesterday's Christmas race a "humbug" paddle, overall winner and defending champion Jimmy Dean saw the Waikiki Surf Club-sponsored event as all trophies and champagne.

The 30-year-old Dean, who won last year's Diamond Head paddle, turned the rugged course in one hour, 20 minutes and 42 seconds-a minute and 36 seconds faster than second-place finisher Keone Dow-

ELEVEN PADDLERS, competing in two divsions, raced from Waikiki's San Souci Beach to Diamond Head and the wreck buoys and back.

'The conditions were rougher than last year," said Dean, an Outrigger Canoe Club paddler and swimmer.
"The toughest part of the race was going out through the surf and the leg coming back to the finish. I've been training for this event for three months. I was up for it.

While Dean topped the overall and Open Class scoring, North Shore lifeguard Edmund Pestana, who was the third paddler to finish, won the eight-contestant Downing Class.

"I didn't think the conditions were so rough," said the 25-year-old paddler, who is used to handling the much bigger Sunset Beach waves. "I thought it was pretty neat off Wai-kiki. But Dean was unbeatable. You could see that he is a fast swimmer by his strong paddling stroke.

In yesterday's closest competition, Downing, who was in third place behind Dean and Pestana on the final

leg to the crowded San Souci Beach finish, staged an incrediable comefrom-behind sprint to nip Pestana by less than two seconds.

"I WAS 15 YARDS behind Edmund turning into the channel," explained Downing, "when I started looking for a better line to come in on. Pestana caught a wave that he rode to the right while I followed the bumps that took me straight in. As we both arrived at the finish, I had the momentum.'
