The Sun Shines On Our Surfers

Because Hawaii generally is considered the home of surfing, it was only fitting that our Hawaii swimmers came away with most of the laurels in the World Surfing Championships completed recently at Rincon Beach, Puerto Rico.

It is doubtful that the World Championships ever will be held here because we already have such global classics as the Makaha International and the Duke Kahanamoku Invitational.

But wherever they go, Hawaii's surfers are looked up to when it comes to conquering the big

And it is obvious now that Fred Hemmings may be the finest big wave rider in the history of the sport. There's no way to compare his greatness with stars of the olden days, such as Duke Kahanamoku, who surfed with an 80-pound board.

But until someone comes along who is better, Hemmings will have to rate up there with Hawaiian sports heroes of the past as the Duke and the late Ted Makalena.

Of course, Fred wasn't the only medal winner from here in Puerto Rico. Sharon Weber finished second in the women's division and Martha Sunn came in fourth. Rene Abellira finished sixth in the men's division.

All our competitors in Puerto Rico, from team captain Fred Downing on down, were a credit to Hawaii in the championships there and are to be congratulated on their performances.

Getting Ready for Makaha Meet

With their international recognition, our surfers now will return to Hawaii to compete in the Makaha event, which gets underway Dec. 21.

Accompanying them will be the greatest surfers from the rest of the world, including the fine contingent from Australia and the West Coast stars, to compete here during the winter meets.

The Makaha always is a well-run tournament, but it would be better with more cooperation from City and State officials. More police could be used at the site to help control the traffic there.

The City Parks and Recreation Department should give more assistance on keeping the beach neat and clean. Refuse cans are overflowing after the first day of competition and they stay that way for days — until trash pick-up trucks come.

The rest rooms should be kept cleaner for the huge crowds that annually witness this event.

The Makaha event doesn't start until Dec. 21, but now is the time that the planning should be made to make sure that our biggest surfing event is held in a setting that will give "class" to a world-type tournament.

King of the Surf

Hawaii's Fred Hemmings last week wor the men's world surfing championship at Puerto Rico's Rincon Beach.

Hemmings' win brought the title to the United States for the first time; it previously had been held by Australians and Peruvians.

The 22-year-old Hemmings barely beat out former title holder Midget Farrelly of Australia for the championship.

Using best seven waves of each surfer, Hemmings and Farrelly tied. To break the tie the eighth best wave was considered, with Hemmings finally winning with 326 points-only two more than Farrelly.
