Canoe Paddlers Vie at Kailua

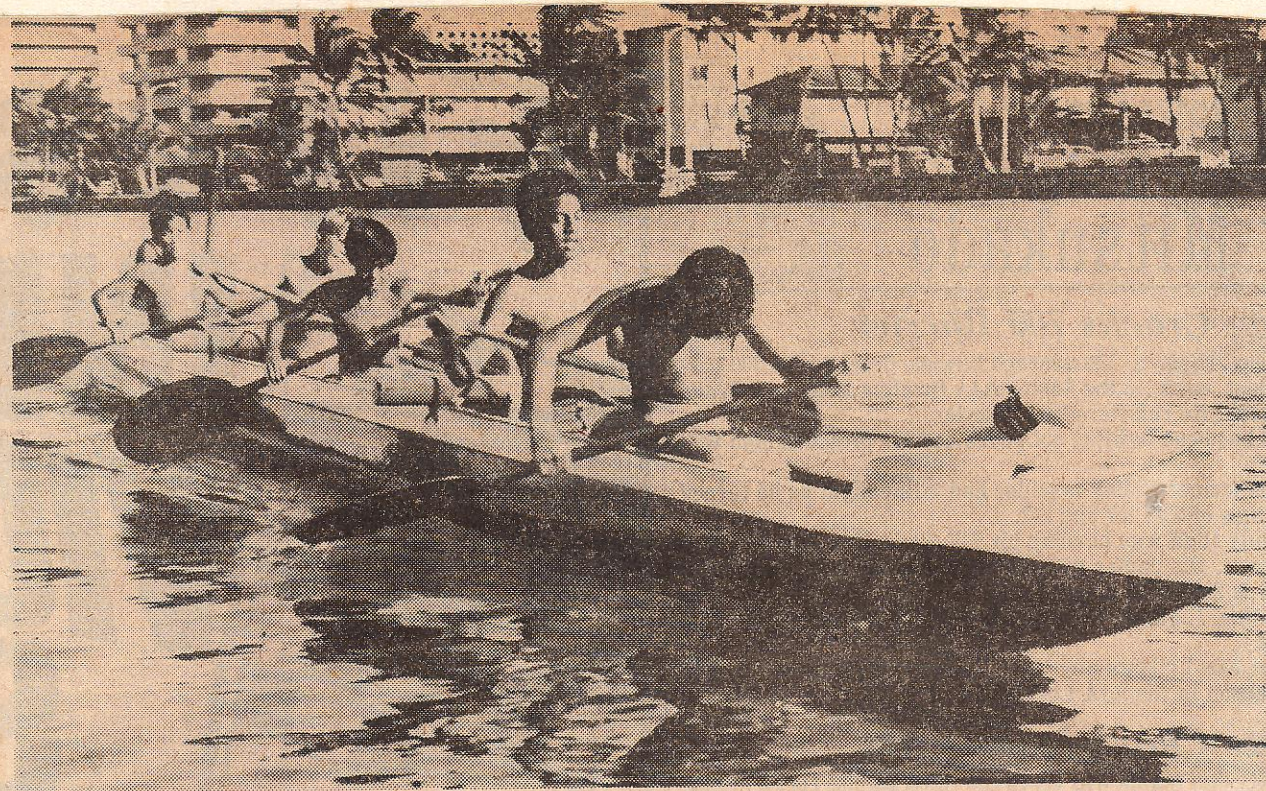
Canoe races will be held today off Kailua Beach, with the first event of a 13-race program starting at 10 a.m.

The Kamehameha Day Celebration Committee is sponsoring the regatta which will be held under the auspices of the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association.

The blue ribbon event will be the men's senior six over 2 1/2 miles. Outrigger Canoe Club, Waikiki Surf, Hui Nalu and Healani are expected to wage a close race for top honors.

Other big events are the men's junior six over two miles and the women's senior six over one mile.

Eleven clubs are entered in the regatta which includes four races for women and five for teenagers in the 12, 13, 14, 16 and 18-year-old brackets.

Waikiki SC wins canoe regatta

It was a perfect day for racing, but not a perfect day for the experts in the Kamehameha Day Regatta at Kailua Beach Park.

The experts, it seems, had figured Healani and Kailua to battle it out for first. But after the 13th race had been run

it was Waikiki Surf Club on top—barely.

Waikiki edged Outrigger Canoe Club, 31 points to 30, for top honors, with Healani third (26 points) and Kailua fourth (23).

The paddlers of the Waikiki Surf Club topped off their fine day of racing by winning the senior men's competition easily over the Outrigger Canoe Club. Waikiki was timed in 18 minutes, 10 seconds for the two-and-a-half-mile race. OCC's time was 18:36.2.

The best race of the day was in the boys-12-and-under competition, where Kailua edged Hui Nalu by three-tenths of a second for the top prize. Kailua was timed in 1:52.0.
