### Waikiki Surf's hopes rising with the return of Napoleon

Joseph "Nappy" Napoleon, the prodigal son of the Waikiki Surf Club, hopped out of an outrigger canoe at Waikiki Beach last Sunday and looked at the club's men, women, children and dogs playing in the surf.

"Feels great," he said, squinting in the afternoon sun. Then, with a grin: "I guess I'm going to rot here now.

Surf Club's members, however, find nothing rotten about the return of Napoleon, 40, who is back as the club's head coach after two years as mentor of the now-dormant Honolulu Canoe Club.

They have all but slain the fatted kalua pig to welcome him back. "Spirit-wise, it's made a difference in

our club," said Luana Froiseth, an old hand at Surf Club. "A lot of people believe in him. "I'm just happy," said Jake Kalo, a

paddler on the senior men's crew. "A lot of people learned under him. He was basically everybody's coach.' Napoleon joined the Waikiki Surf Club

when he was 13 years old. Five years later he switched over to town rival Healani, then returned to Surf Club when he was 23.

# Paddlers carve their do-it-yourself dream

A koa canoe, says Bob Nagatani of the Waikiki Beach Boys, used to be something his club could only dream about having.

But the Beach Boys and a dozen other Hui Wa'a & Surfing Association clubs will soon be paddling in koa, thanks to a four-year project that took 15-ton trees from a forest in Kona and whittled them down to 400-pound racing canoes.

'The older guys in my club never dreamed they'd have a koa canoe," Nagatani says. Koa outrigger canoes, used for transportation, fishing and commerce in old Hawaii, today are used for racing. But it is more than a race for Hawaiians. It is a celebration of their heritage. And the heritage lies

"The koa canoe becomes more than a canoe," Nagatani says. "There's a link with the past. Everybody is looking for legitimacy, a link with the past."

Koa canoes, however, are very expensive In the old days, using not much more than formed for clubs which could not afford it. While the Hawaiian Canoe Racing Association paddles koa, Hui Wa'a races in cheaper

But by September, the first of Hui Wa'a's koa fleet is expected to be in the water for a Hawaiian blessing.

"It hasn't hit the kids yet," Nagatani says, gesturing around the long shed on the Kamehameha Schools campus where seven of the canoes are being built, "but the day these canoes hit the beach they'll go, 'Wow, man' - and thay'll stand a lot taller."

A do-it-yourself spirit enabled Hui Wa'a to embark on what otherwise would have been a prohibitively expensive project. They cut the logs themselves, shipped them to Oahu and, under the guidance of craftsmen Wright Bowman Jr. and Adam Ahai, cut, gouged and sanded the immense logs into sleek,

straight canoes.

Each canoe will cost the clubs about \$3.500.

The whole thing started in 1977 when Kamehameha Canoe Club of Hilo decided to sell, as a fund-raiser, koa logs at \$600

The logs were cut in '77 from the Milolii area of the Big Island, on property owned by the Dillingham and Carlsmith families. There they stayed until August of '79, when a log loader and seven heavy trucks could be mustered at the same time to haul the logs to the pier at Kawaihae, from which they were barged to Honolulu.

At Sand Island the logs were rough-carved and hollowed out into the basic shape. Then they were trucked to Kamehameha, Makaha and Kahana for finishing.

Bowman, a 37-year-old machinist and one of a handful of master canoe builders in the state, says an average koa log will weigh 15 tons, a rough-cut log two tons and the finished, 40-foot-long product 400 pounds.

- \$10,000-15,000 apiece - and Hui Wa'a was a stone adze and a red-hot imu stone (to burn the log to ease hollowing-out), canoe builders would take four months or more to carve a canoe.

Today, using chain saws, belt sanders and a rotary "digger" machined by Bowman, building a canoe takes about 21/2 months.

"First thing I do is plane the top," Bow, man says. "That way I have a reference point, so anytime I turn the boat I know where I am.

Shaping the hull is done simply by eyeballing it - "Hawaiian Eye," Bowman says. Assisting Bowman and Ahai are son Sam Ahai, Bill Winchester Sr., Pali Palakiko, Sonny Keaweehu, Jason Tabata and Eric

"I was raised in a canoe," says Ahai, the 70-year-old coach of Kamehameha Canoe Club. "My dream was to build a koa canoe before I die." He's building a baker's dozen

# OCC ohana wins Macfarlane

Outrigger Canoe Club saved its best for last yesterday, coming from behind to capture its own Walter J. Macfarlane Regatta at Waikiki Beach. Outrigger, which stood as low as sixth

in the older divisions, including the twomile senior men's event, to claim the Macfarlane perpetual trophy. Walter Guild, Outrigger's head coach and a distant relative of former OCC

president Macfarlane, said his club was determined to win the meet. "We were ready for this regatta." a happy Guild said after the meet. "We were pumped up, because this meet

means a lot to us as a family. Our club is like a family. 'We look at this trophy yearly (the trophy is encased throughout the year at the Outrigger Hotel), so we know what it means. We just gave it our best shot. But

we trained a little harder for this meet." Outrigger finished with 74 points and Hui Nalu, which won last week's John Kaupiko Regatta at Waikiki, finished second with 65 points. Waikiki Surf Club and Healani finished tied for third with 42 points each

Guild said Outrigger may have had an advantage in the race because all of its practices are held in the surf at Waikiki. but he emphasized it was the determination of the club that pulled it through.

"We shot for this race the whole year long," he said. "This was the first goal that we accomplished for this year.'

The regatta was held in near-perfect conditions as the waves peaked at 2-3 feet. Earlier in the week, OCC officials had feared high surf might necessitate the use of fiberglass canoes, but yester-

day all the clubs paddled their koa. 'The waves were good for us, but they were slightly disastrous for some other

clubs," Guild said. One of the "disasters" during the 81/2-

hour regatta was a crash between the Hawaiian Warriors and Surf Club during the women's sophomore event.

The Warriors, who had borrowed a canoe from Hui Lanakila after their boat was damaged prior to the regatta, lost control in the tough surf during the home stretch and rammed Surf Club's 45-yearold canoe, Malia.

The Surf Club canoe suffered four 30foot and three 20-foot cracks on the side opposite the ama. Also, a hole - estimated by Surf Club advisor Wally Froiseth to be about "30 inches by six inches" - was discovered in the floor near the fourth seat. The Warriors' boat suffered minor damage.

After a 30-minute repair session, Malia returned to competition. 'We filled the holes and cracks with

cardboard and tape," Froiseth said. "We have a tradition with this team - we race no matter what happens. A couple of years ago the whole front of the canoe fell off, but we still re-entered the race. It's a challenge for us."

Froiseth said the accident came at an inopportune moment, since Surf Club was in second place when the crash took That was one of the biggest waves

that we caught all day," Froiseth lament-Surf Club still managed a third-place finish with 42 points. Actually, Surf Club

ended the regatta tied with Healani, but they won the tie-breaking coin toss. The Macfarlane Regatta has been an annual event since 1943.
