Heart Association Honors 2 Doctors

Two Island physicians last night received top awards from the Hawaii Heart Association at the association's annual dinner meeting at the Outrigger Canoe Club.

Dr. Alfred D. Morris received the award for distinguished achievement in cardiovascular medicine. Dr. Unoji Goto was presented the award for distinguished service to the association and to the community.

Mrs. Anna Lindsey Perry-Fiske of Waimea received a special award for her mounted spectacle, "Old Hawaii on Horseback."

Morris developed the association's heart screening project, in which cardiac abnormalities can be detected in two minutes.

Goto was recognized for his leadership in the association, including two terms as president, and his present membership on the American Heart Association's board of trustees.

Also honored were more than a dozen volunteers who have made extraordinary contributions to the association during the past year.

They include Mrs. Philip E. Spalding Jr. and Mrs. H. Sheldon Tubbs, co-chairmen of the "Art for Heart's Sake" auction for 10 years; Mrs. Siegfried Ramler, 1968-69 Heart Sunday chairman; Mrs. Roderick F. McPhee, 1968-69 vice chairman; Mrs. Arch W.
